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CHAPTER-I

INTRODUCTION

The Sports Authority of India was set up by the Govt. in the year 1984 as a Society registered under the Societies' Registration Act, 1860, with the twin objective of broad-basing of sports and to achieve excellence at the national/international level.

Subsequently, in order to adopt an integrated approach towards promotion and development of sports, the erstwhile Society for National Institute of Physical Education & Sports (SNIPES) consisting of NSNIS, Patiala and its Centres and the two Lakshmbai National Colleges of Physical Education (LNCPEs) located at Gwalior and Thiruvananthapuram, was merged with SAI w.e.f. 1st May, 1987. The LNCPE, Gwalior was, however, delinked from SAI in September, 1995 on attaining the status of a "Deemed University" (now re-christened as Lakshmbai National University of Physical Education, Gwalior).

Aims & Objectives

- To promote and broad-base sports in the country
- Talent identification and development
- To implement schemes/programmes for achieving excellence in sports in different disciplines at international level in order to establish India as a major sporting power
- To manage the stadia in Delhi, which were constructed/renovated for the IXth Asian Games held in 1982
- To act as an interface between the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports and other agencies concerned with the promotion/development of sports in the country
- To establish, run, manage and administer the institutions to produce high caliber coaches, sports scientists and physical education teachers
- To plan, construct, acquire, develop, take over, manage, maintain and utilize sports infrastructure and facilities in the country
- To initiate, undertake, sponsor, stimulate and encourage research projects related to various sports sciences for upgradation of sports, sportspersons and coaches
- Other incidental issues concerning promotion, development and excellence in sports

General Body and the Governing Body of SAI

The Hon'ble Prime Minister of India is the ex-officio President of the Society (SAI). Hon'ble Union Minister In-charge of Sports is the Vice-President of the Society. The Governing Body of SAI is headed by the Union Minister of Youth Affairs & Sports and Union Minister of State for Youth Affairs & Sports is its Vice-Chairman. During the year, two meetings of the Governing Body were held on 14.10.2008 and 23.02.2009 under the Chairmanship of Dr. M.S. Gill, Hon'ble Union Minister for Youth Affairs & Sports. The composition of the General Body and the Governing Body is placed at **Annexure-I** & **Annexure-II** respectively.

Organisational Set-up

Director General is the Principal Executive Officer of SAI assisted by two Special Officers (in the level of Joint Secretary) for CWG-2010, Secretary, Executive Directors and Heads of the Academic institutions/Regional Centres/Sub-Centres. A chart giving details of the Organisational set-up is placed at **Annexure-III**.

CHAPTER-II

- To raise the technical competence and knowledge of the coaches by conducting refresher courses
- To conduct refresher courses for PE teachers
- To provide organizational support, documentation and sports science information to all concerned with a view to achieve excellence in sports
- To liaise with other organizations/sports bodies, State Govts./UT Admn., to provide information on sports related subjects.
- To identify sports talent among different age groups and grooming them for achieving excellence in their performance
- To provide scientific back-up to sports persons in achieve high level performance in sports.

The different sports promotional schemes and the academic programmes of SAI are being implemented through the Regional Centres/Sub-Centres spread across the country. The details of the schemes and the academic programmes are indicated in the chapters-III & IV of the report.

The details of the Centres/Sub-Centres are indicated in the succeeding paras.

I. SAI Netaji Subhas Eastern Centre, Kolkata

Academic Programmes:

- (iv) **Special Refresher Course** in Hockey discipline was conducted for SAI Coaches from 29.12.2008 to 04.01.2009.
- (v) American Sports Coaches Swimming Clinic was held on 10th & 11th April, 2009 by three World renowned American Coaches headed by John Leonard, Jack Bauerie, and Richard Shoulberg. 70 coaches participated in the said Clinic.

Faculty of Sports Sciences:

Faculty of Sports Sciences was established at this centre in the year 1990, in collaboration with erstwhile USSR, with the following objectives:

- To enhance the performance of national sports persons through scientific evaluation of training.
- To identify sports talent among the children of southern states.
- To monitor the growth and development of talented children in southern region under various schemes.
- To take up applied research/projects to enhance the performance.
- To make the coaches understand and implement the modern methods of scientific training.

Faculty of Sports Sciences has departments of **Sports Physiology, Sports Psychology, General Theory and Methods of Training (GTMT), Biomechanics and Sports Medicine** with imported and indigenous equipment for conducting various tests and training.

National Coaching Camps:

National Coaching Camps at different levels are held at the Centre due to availability of vast infrastructure, scientific back-up, supplemented with moderate climatic conditions throughout the year. Most of the National Coaching camps in different sports disciplines in preparation for Commonwealth Games-2010, Asian Games-2010, Olympics, World Cup and other International Competitions were held at the Centre.

Apart from Bangalore, the national coaching camps were also held at Sarooranagar Indoor Stadium, Secunderbad, Gachibowli Stadium, Hyderabad (Badminton), Rowing Academy, Hyderabad (Rowing men and Junior), SAG Centre, Alleppey (Kayak), STC

CHAPTER-III

SPORTS PROMOTIONAL SCHEMES OF SAI

The Operation Division deals with Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI aimed at development and promotion of sports at grass-root level in the country and to achieve excellence at the national/international level by grooming the talented children. The following Sports Promotional Schemes are being implemented by the Operations Division through the Regional Centres/Sub-Centres/Academic Institutions :-

- 1) National Sports Talent Contest (NSTC) Scheme
- 2) Army Boys Sports Companies (ABSC) Scheme
- 3) SAI Training Centre (STC) Scheme
- 4) Special Area Games (SAG) Scheme
- 5) Centre of Excellence (COE) Scheme

The salient features of these Schemes are indicated in the succeeding paragraphs.

I. National Sports Talent Contest (NSTC) Scheme

Introduction

The National Sports Talent Contest Scheme was launched during 1985 under which the talented young children between the age group of 8-14 years are spotted and nurtured by providing scientific training.

Objectives

The main concept of the scheme is to PLAY & STUDY in the same school. The scheme envisages scientific scouting of talent at optimum age essential for converting the genetically and physiologically gifted children into future medal hopes in various competitions at National and International level.

Adoption of Schools

Under the scheme, the schools having good sports infrastructure are adopted. Each adopted school in addition to the services of coaches for imparting training to the trainees gets financial assistance for purchase of consumable sports equipment.

Selection Criteria

The selection of trainees under the above scheme is done on potential / performance basis.

- Medal winners in State/National Level Competitions are automatically admitted into the Scheme subject to their being found medically fit.
- Medal winners at District Level Competitions or have participation in State Level Competitions are admitted subject to their being found fit medically and physically and also have the required potential which is assessed by battery of tests.

- Selection from remote, tribal & coastal areas is done by organizing competitions.
- The selection for team games as well as individual events is done by a Selection Committee consisting of representatives of SAI, School/Akhara, SAI coaches, Sports Scientists etc.
- The sports persons identified on this basis are offered admission after age verification, medical examination and finding suitable by applying battery of tests.

Disciplines Covered

Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Boxing, Football, Gymnastics, Hockey, Judo, Kabaddi, Swimming, Table Tennis, Tennis, Volleyball, Wrestling and Indigenous Games & Martial Arts.

Facilities Provided

Under the Scheme, selected trainees are admitted on non-residential basis. However, in exceptional cases, the trainees are admitted on residential basis and they are provided boarding & lodging facilities.

Keeping in view the need to promote sports in remote and rural areas & to provide greater balance for village children, the Governing Body in its 27th meeting held on 9th July, 2001 approved the proposal for extension of NSTC Scheme to Navodaya Vidyalayas having the requisite infrastructure. These Centres are established in association with Navodaya Vidyalaya Samiti. These schools also act as feeder centres to SAI Training Centres and SAG Centres.

The scheme is a joint venture of the Army Authorities and Sports Authority of India with a view to leveraging the excellent infrastructure, efficient administration and disciplined environment for sports training available in the various Army Regimental Centres. Boys in the age group of 8-16 years are inducted under the scheme. After attaining the required age, the trainees are also offered job in the Army.

Selection Criteria

The selection of trainees under the above scheme is done on potential and performance basis as applicable under the NSTC Scheme.

Disciplines Covered

Athletics, Archery, Basketball, Boxing, Diving, Football, Gymnastics, Handball, Hockey, Kayaking & Canoeing, Swimming, Shooting, Rowing, Volleyball, Wrestling & Weightlifting.

Facilities Provided

Under the Scheme, the trainees are provided Boarding & lodging, Educational Expenses, Sports kit, Insurance, Medical cover, Competition exposure & scientific coaching from experienced coaches.

III. SAI Training Centres (STC) Scheme

The main objective of the scheme is to train meritorious sports persons in the age group of 14-21 years. Relaxation in age is given in meritorious cases and also in disciplines of Gymnastics and Swimming. Under the scheme, the Centres are set up in joint collaboration with State Govt./UT Administration and SAI. The following facilities are provided by the State Government and the Sports Authority of India:

a) Facilities to be provided by the State Govt.:

A suitable building for hostel with facilities for catering, library, recreation and family accommodation for In-charge of the Hostel and the coaches.

- Playfields/ Indoor Hall/ Swimming Pool depending on the disciplines identified.
- Maintenance of playfields for day to day training.
- Annual maintenance of the hostel building.

b) Facilities to be provided by SAI:

- Furniture for hostel and catering equipment.
- Nutritious and balanced diet.
- Sports kit.
- Coaches.
- Sports equipment.
- Medical assistance and insurance.
- Administrative and catering staff.
- Electricity, water and administrative staff.

Selection Criteria

- Medal winners in State/National Level Competitions in Individual events and Team games are automatically admitted into the Scheme subject to their being found medically fit.
- Medal winners at District Level Competition or having participation in State Level Competitions are admitted subject to their being found fit medically/physically and also having the required potential which is assessed by battery of tests.

Athletics, Archery, Badminton, Basketball, Boxing, Canoeing & Kayaking, Cycling, Football, Fencing, Gymnastics, Handball, Hockey, Judo, Kabaddi, Karate, Lawn Tennis,

Swimming, Sepak-Takraw, Shooting, Softball, Table Tennis, Taekwando, Volleyball, Weightlifting, Wrestling, & Wushu

Facilities Provided

- (i) Annual Maintenance Grant **Rs.7.50 lacs** per centre per annum
- (ii) Scientific training is imparted to inducted trainees by the experienced coaches, besides Boarding & lodging, Sports kit, Competition exposure, insurance & medical cover, educational expenses and TA/DA for Home Town once a year. The management, maintenance and upkeep of the centres are looked after by the SAI.

IV. Special Area Games (SAG) Scheme

The main objective of the scheme is to scout natural talent for modern competitive games and sports from tribal, rural, coastal and hilly areas of the country and also from regions having genetic/geographic advantage and nurturing them scientifically for achieving excellence in modern competitive games and sports. The trainees are adopted in the age group of 14-21 years.

The Special Area Games Centres are started in consultation with the State Govts./UT Administration. The State Govt. has to provide requisite land with infrastructure. However, in case of non-availability of infrastructure, the State Govt. has to provide developed land on long-term lease basis to SAI enabling it to create the required facilities.

Selection Criteria

- (a) Medal winners in State/National Level Competitions are automatically admitted into the Scheme subject to their being found medically fit.
- (b) Medal winners at District Level Competition or having participation in State Level Competitions are admitted subject to their being found fit medically/physically and also having the required potential, which is assessed by battery of tests.

Facilities Provided

- (i) Annual Maintenance Grant **Rs.7.50 lacs** per centre per annum
- (ii) The details of financial assistance being provided to residential and non-residential trainees under the scheme are given below :-

Extension Centres of STC/SAG Centres to cover schools/colleges for wider coverage

The basic concept of the scheme is to develop sports standard in schools and colleges which organize specific sports and have shown commendable results. The trainees in the age group of 14-21 years are adopted under the scheme.

Selection of the Schools/Colleges

Schools and colleges actively involved in sports and having adequate infrastructure are eligible under this scheme. The school/college should have a past history of producing national and international sports persons and should also be agreeable to the norms laid down by the Sports Authority of India from time to time for selection of the talented children.

Selection of Trainees & Age group:

There will not be more than 20 trainees in a School/College between the age group of 14 to 21. The students of nearby schools/colleges can also be admitted. The selection of trainees is done by a duly constituted committee consisting of (1) Regional Director or his representative (2) The Head of the College/Institute or his representative (3) Experts/Coaches from the school/college of the concerned discipline (4) Outstanding sports persons of the area.

Monitoring:

The Extension Centres are monitored by the nearest STC/SAG and the Regional Centre Head under which it falls. The power to sanction such centres would rest with the Director General, SAI.

- (i) Annual Maintenance grant upto Rs.1.00 lacs per centre per annum for 20 players

The services of coaches are provided to these Schools/Colleges on requirement basis.

Status Position:

At present, there are **75 Extension Centres**, in which **1202 trainees** (746 Boys & 456 Girls) are being trained (**Annexure-XI**).

V. Centre of Excellence (COE) Scheme

The scheme envisages advance training of elite sports persons in particular disciplines and also to provide competition exposure. The trainees in the age group of 17-25 years are selected under the scheme who have shown promising performance in the senior national competitions.

The Centres of Excellence operate as regular coaching camps for the best available talent in India and provide two or possibly three concurrent layers of highly skilled sports persons giving a wider choice of talent and continuity for later selection to National Teams and provide alternative second and third options for the National Teams.

Selection Criteria

Best six in Sr. National Competitions or Jr. International Competitions provided they have the potential to continue in competitive sports for at least 2 to 3 years.

Trainees showing excellent performance in the Schemes of SAI as well as talented sports persons scouted collectively by the SAI and National Sports Federations for advance training.

Facilities Provided

Under the Scheme, the trainees are admitted both on residential and non-residential basis where they are provided scientific training by experienced coaches. They are also provided AC 2nd Class to and fro train fare for Home town twice a year, besides the following facilities:

CHAPTER-IV

ACADEMIC DIVISION

The Academic Division of SAI consists of Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports (NSNIS), Patiala and the Lakshmi Bai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Thiruvananthapuram.

I. Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports, Patiala

The National Institute of Sports, set up by the Govt. of India on 7th May, 1961 to herald an era of systematic and scientific sports coaching in country, dedicated in the year 1973 to the memory of Netaji Subhas Chander Bose, became Academic Division of SAI w.e.f 1st May, 1987. It is considered as a premier sports Institute in Asia and is located at Moti Bagh Palace, Patiala (Punjab) with a total area of 268 Acres.

Aims & Objectives of the Institute:

- To conduct short & long term academic courses in sports coaching, sports sciences and other related fields.
- To raise the competence of the coaches through organization of Refresher Courses for Coaches.
- To provide assistance to the National Sports Federations for conducting National Coaching Camps.
- To provide scientific back-up to the elite sportspersons for achievement of high level performance.
- To organize conferences, seminars and workshops, on sports related subjects.
- To serve as a source of information and counseling on sports infrastructure, through experts.
- To implement sports promotional schemes of the MYA&S
- To implement Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI.
- To identify sports talent in identified disciplines and to groom them through scientific sports coaching for achieving excellence in sports.

The following academic training courses/programmes were conducted by the institute during the year :-

1. Diploma Courses in Sports Coaching

The one year diploma course was conducted by the Institute, at three places in different disciplines, as per details given below :-

Overall, 387 students underwent training for the Diploma Course in 21 sports disciplines, at these three centres and the successful students would be awarded Diploma in Annual Graduation Ceremony of the Diploma Course to be held in the near future at the above places.

2. M.Sc. in Sports Coaching

The two-year degree Course is conducted by the Institute at Patiala only. No candidate was found suitable for admission in M.Sc. Course, for the session 2008-10. 5 students were promoted to the 2nd year (2006-08) of M.Sc. Course, i.e., 1 in Athletics; 1 in Basketball, 2 in Volleyball and 1 in Swimming.

3. Certificate Courses in Sports Coaching

The 6-Week Certificate Course in Sports Coaching was conducted by the Institute at different SAI Centres, i.e., at Patiala, Thiruvananthapuram, Gandhinagar, Aurangabad, Bangalore, Kolkata, and Kandivali(E), Mumbai.

4. Refresher Courses for Coaches

The following Refresher courses were conducted during 2008-09:

- (a) Special course for Sri Lankan Boxing Coaches from 17th to 26th November, 2008
- (b) Refresher Course in Table Tennis & Wrestling under Foreign experts from 19th December, 2008 to 2nd January, 2009
- (c) Refresher course in Athletics under foreign experts from 2nd to 13th February, 2009

5. Faculty of Sports Sciences

The Faculty supports the teaching faculty and also provides support to the national campers attending coaching camps from time to time. The Faculty of Sports Sciences, established in 1961, consists of following Departments :-

- i) Department of Exercise Physiology
- ii) Department of Training Methods
- iii) Department of Sports Biomechanics
- iv) Department of Sports Psychology
- v) Department of Sports Anthropometry
- vi) Department of Biochemistry
- vii) Department of Sports Nutrition

A Workshop was organized for campers of 2010 Commonwealth Games in which scientific support provided by different sports departments was discussed in detail so as to enhance sports performance through better scientific means of training. As a matter of fact, Sports Sciences are an integral part of the training of sports persons.

6. Management of National Coaching Camps

Under the Long-Term Development Plan (LTDP), the Institute conducts national coaching camps for training of elite sportspersons at Patiala and the SAI High Altitude Training Centre, Shillaroo (Himachal Pradesh).

During the year 2008-09, the institute conducted 38 National Coaching Camps: 07 in Athletics, 06 in Boxing, 02 in Cycling, 01 in Gymnastics, 02 in Handball, 02 in Judo, 07 in Table Tennis, 09 in Wrestling, 02 in Weightlifting.

7. Centre of Excellence

In order to build up proficiency of outstanding sportspersons for excellence at the international level, the Sports Authority of India has set up Centres of Excellence at number of places in the country.

One such Centre is functioning at the SAI Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports, Patiala, where training is being imparted to 90 trainees in the disciplines of Athletics (boys and girls), Cycling (boys and girls), Hockey (boys only) and Judo (boys and girls).

8. SAI Training Centre, Patiala

One SAI Training Centre is also in operation at Patiala where 108 Regular trainees and 86 Day Boarders are being trained in the disciplines of Archery, Athletics, Boxing, Cycling, Fencing, Gymnastics, Hockey, Judo, Shooting and Wushu.

9. Implementation of MYAS Schemes

The following schemes of MYAS were implemented by the Institute on agency basis :-

- i) Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan
- ii) National Sports Festival for Women
- iii) North East Sports Festival
- iv) Promotion of sports and games in schools
- v) Sports Scholarships

Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan

The Rural Sports Programme which was in existence since 1970-71, has been subsumed in the newly instituted scheme "Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan (PYKKA)" from the year 2008-09, with the following objectives :-

- i) To provide universal access to sports in rural areas and promote a sports culture among boys and girls.
- ii) To harness available and potential sporting talent among rural youth through a well designed competition structure from the block level.

- iii) To put in place an effective mechanism to identify and nurture sporting talent in rural areas.
- iv) To promote both indigenous and modern games; and
- v) To create seamless integration between the competition structure right from the Panchayat level through to the National level in order to facilitate exponential growth in the number of high performing sports persons.

The programme is being implemented by SAI NS NIS Patiala on behalf of Govt. of India in collaboration with States/UTs Administrations.

Under the programme, competitions are organized at Block, Distt. and State level within the States/UTs. and participants selected in these competitions are further sent by the States/UTs to the National level competitions.

II. Lakshmibai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Thiruvananthapuram

The Lakshmibai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Thiruvananthapuram, was set up on 17th August, 1985 by the then Deptt. of Youth Affairs & Sports, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India. Subsequently, the College became an Academic Division of SAI at par with National Institute of Sports, Patiala, consequent to amalgamation of Society for National Institute of Physical Education & Sports (SNIPES) Board with SAI w.e.f. 1st May, 1987.

The College aims to provide excellent facilities for the upliftment of physical education & sports in the country and to serve as the model institute for teachers' training by offering under-graduate, post-graduate and research courses. The College is affiliated to the University of Kerala.

Aims & objectives

- To prepare highly competent and skilled leaders in the field of physical education, sports and games.
- To serve as a centre of excellence for research in physical education, sports sciences and allied areas
- To provide technical professional and academic leadership to other institutions of physical education
- To develop and promote programmes of mass physical education activity.
- To develop model health and fitness programmes for the general population and sports persons in specific.

CHAPTER-V

TEAMS DIVISION

TEAMS (Training of Elite Athletes and Management Support) Division is entrusted with the responsibility of preparing the national teams in different disciplines for various national and international sports events, in coordination with the National Sports Federations concerned, on behalf of the Ministry of YA & Sports. In other words, it provides necessary facilities to elite sportspersons preparing for international sports events like Olympic Games, Asian Games, Commonwealth Games and various other international competitions in India and abroad. It implements the plans prepared by various National Sports Federations vide their LTDPs and approved by the Committee for preparation of National Teams for National and International tournaments by providing the following facilities :

(i) Coaching Camps

168 Coaching Camps in 26 disciplines were held **under the Scheme for “Financial Assistance to National Sports Federations”** and **51 coaching camps** in 17 disciplines were held under the Scheme for **“Preparation of Indian Teams for Commonwealth Games.”**

(ii) Sports Science back-up

It provided scientific back-up in the form of doctors in Sports Medicine, Scientists, Physiotherapists and Masseurs etc. to the sports persons during national coaching camps for enhancing their fitness, recovery from injury and recovery from medical deficiency.

(iii) Coaching Support

It provided coaches, Indian as well as Foreign, for coaching and training of the players during the national coaching camps and for accompanying the teams abroad.

(iv) Engagement of Foreign Coaches

It engaged 35 Foreign Coaches (including 04 on short-term basis) to train and coach the national coaching campers in 19 sports disciplines and also Indian coaches with the latest technique of playing.

(v) Financial assistance to outstanding sportspersons and supporting personnel for extensive training abroad

It implemented the MYAS Scheme relating to talent search and training for financial assistance to outstanding sportspersons/supporting persons for extensive training abroad under expert foreign coaches. During the year, 41 sportspersons and 10 coaches/supporting personnel were assisted under the Scheme for Advance Training.

(vi) Equipment Support

It provided necessary equipment support, both imported as well as indigenous, to the national campers.

(vii) Achievements of the Indian teams

The achievements of Indian teams in different sports disciplines at the international level during the year 2008-09 are indicated in the **Annexure-XIX**.

CHAPTER-VI

COACHING DIVISION

The Coaching Division deals with service matters of Coaches. The National Coaching Scheme caters to the objectives of broad-basing sports throughout the country and provides scientific training to the sportspersons in different age groups to achieve excellence in sports.

The coaches are utilized to impart training to young sportspersons under different sports promotional schemes of SAI. Coaches are also provided to the State Govts./UT Admn. for their State Coaching Centres. In addition to this, the coaches are also involved in the training of National Teams and in the Academic Wing for conducting Diploma/Master Degree Courses in different sports disciplines. The coaches are being provided to Universities/Navodaya and Kendriya Vidyalayas also for imparting coaching/training. Monitoring System has been introduced for effective utilization of services of coaches.

During the year :

- a) Fifteen coaches in different disciplines were sent abroad for attending the International Coaching Course, as per the details indicated at **Annexure-XX**.
- b) 118 Grade-I Coaches were promoted to Selection Grade and 140 Grade-II Coaches were promoted to Grade-I. As on 31.03.2009, SAI has 1306 coaches in different grades on regular basis and 91 coaches on Contract basis.

CHAPTER-VII

STADIA DIVISION

The Stadia Division is responsible for formulating policy guidelines for utilization of different facilities created in the stadia at Delhi with the twin objective of broad-basing sports and to achieve excellence in sports.

Objectives:

To provide facilities and venues for

- National /International competitions
- National Coaching Camps
- Regular coaching for local talent
- Pay & Play activities
- Educational Institutions/Federations/other organizations to conduct their sports tournament(s) at different levels

CHAPTER-IX

INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION CELL

In pursuance to MYAS letter dated 02nd January, 2008, the International Cooperation Cell was set up in SAI to coordinate the activities of international cooperation in the field of Sports, such as, matters relating to exchange of experts/coaches, advance training of athletes and participation of sports personnel in international events hosted by the partner countries to contribute towards excellence in sports. Proposals for MoUs/CEPs with different countries in the field of sports were sent by SAI to Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports on their request. Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India, executed MOUs with the following countries during the year 2008-09 :-

- (i) MoU on sports cooperation between Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India and National Institute of Sports at Chile signed on 21st April, 2008 for a period of 3 years.
- (ii) MoU on Youth & Sports cooperation between Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India and the State Ministry of Youth & Sports Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia signed on 01st December, 2008 for a period of 3 years.
- (iii) MoU on cooperation in Sports & Youth Affairs between Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India and the Govt. of the Federative Republic of Brazil signed on 18th February, 2008 for a period of 5 years.

CHAPTER-X

HINDI DIVISION

The important activities of Hindi Division during the year 2008-09 were as under :-

- (i) Hindi Pakhwara was organized by SAI from 1st to 15th Sept., 2008 and a number of programmes/competitions were organized for creating awareness among the SAI employees about Hindi.
- (ii) The Parliamentary Committee on Official Language visited SAI North-East Sub Centre, Guwahati on 22.09.2008, SAG Centre, Alleppey on 01.12.2008 and STC, Mumbai on 6.3.2009 and expressed its satisfaction with the visit to these Centres. Action Taken Report on the observations made by Parliamentary Committee during its above visits was also sent to MYAS for onward transmission to the Parliamentary Committee office.
- (iii) The Hindi Division of SAI HOs visited LNCPE, Thiruvananthapuram from 16-24 June, 2008, NSNIS, Patiala from 4-5 November, 2008, Northern Centre, Sonapat from 6-7 November, 2008 and Eastern Centre, Kolkata on 11th December, 2008 and organized Hindi Workshops there wherein the staff members were imparted training in Hindi noting/drafting etc.

CHAPTER-XI COMMONWEALTH GAMES 2010

The Commonwealth Games which are considered to be the second largest International multi-disciplinary sporting event after the Olympic Games, are held every four years. The XIX Commonwealth Games are scheduled to be held in Delhi from 3rd to 14th October, 2010. Approximately, 8000 sportspersons from 71 countries are likely to participate in these Games. India has got the distinction of hosting these coveted Games for the first time. Hosting a sporting event of a scale such as the Commonwealth Games is a matter of International prestige for the country, and is bound to boost brand India. The legacy of the Games will be to boost the sports culture as part of the daily life of every Indian, particularly, the youth.

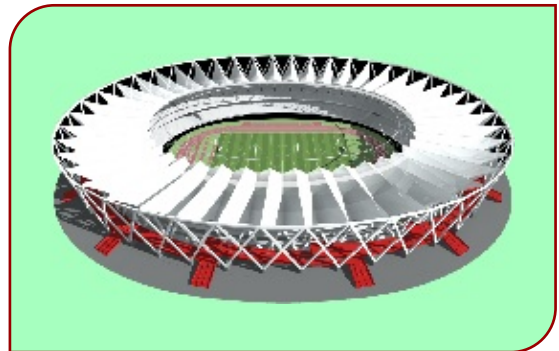

II. Coordination Division

Coordination Division is a hub Centre of SAI, primarily dealing with issues relating to Parliament/Parliamentary Committees, Memorandum of Association & Rules of SAI, including conduct of meetings of the General Body/Governing Body. It is also responsible for preparing Annual Report and its submission to MYAS alongwith Audit Report & Audited Accounts of SAI for laying before the two Houses of Parliament. This apart, it also liaises with other Divisions/Regional Centres/Academic Institutions/MYAS on issues of general nature.

Director (Coord.), SAI HOs, is the Chief Coordination Officer for RTI applications and Director General, SAI, is the First Appellate Authority. Further, Director/Dy. Director level officers, Division-wise/Region-wise have been appointed as CPIOs under the Act vide Notification dated 15.09.2008.

III. Equipment Support Division

Under the Scheme of Central Pool of Technical Sports Equipment, imported as well as indigenous sports equipment are being procured by SAI and supplied to the sports persons being trained to represent the country in national and international competitions. The sports equipment are also being procured/provided to the various SAI Centres running the various sports promotional schemes. A list indicating the details of sports equipment imported during the current year is enclosed as **Annexure-XXI**.

IV. Sports Medicine Centre at SAI HOs

The Sports Medicine Centre (SMC) at SAI HOs was established in 1984 as a Plan Scheme of SAI with the objective of providing comprehensive sports medicine back-up to the following categories of sports personnel :-

- (i) Those attending national coaching camps in Delhi;
- (ii) Those attending regular training at SAI stadia in Delhi;
- (iii) Those participating in competitions held in SAI stadia in Delhi;
- (iv) Those residing at the Residential Wing of SAI in Delhi;
- (v) Emergency medical cover for SAI staff and their families

Since SAI stadia being venues for the Commonwealth Games-2010 were handed over to CPWD for creating requisite sports infrastructure, the Medical Centre was also temporarily shifted to I.G. Stadium alongwith the other offices of SAI.
