

CHAPTER-I

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The Sports Authority of India (SAI) is an Autonomous Body set up by the Government of India in the year 1984 as a Society registered under the Societies' Registration Act, 1860. The erstwhile Society for National Institutes of Physical Education & Sports (SNIPES) consisting of NSNIS, Patiala at its Centres and the two Lakshmi Bai National Colleges of Physical Education (LNCPEs) located at Gwalior and Thiruvananthapuram, were amalgamated with SAI w.e.f. 1st May, 1987. The LNCPE, Gwalior was, however, delinked from SAI in September, 1995 on attaining the status of a "Deemed University".

1.1 AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- To promote and broad-base sports in the country
- Talent identification and development
- To implement schemes/programmes for achieving excellence in sports in different disciplines at international level in order to establish India as a major sporting power
- To manage the Stadia in Delhi, which were constructed /renovated for the IXth Asian Games held in 1982
- To act as an interface between the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports and other agencies concerned with the promotion/development of sports in the country
- To establish, run, manage and administer the institutions to produce high caliber coaches, sports scientists and physical education teachers
- To plan, construct, acquire, develop, take over, manage, maintain and utilize sports infrastructure and facilities in the country
- To initiate, undertake, sponsor, stimulate and encourage research projects related to various sports sciences for up gradation of sports, sportspersons and coaches
- Other incidental issues concerning promotion, development and excellence in sports

1.2 GENERAL BODY & MEMBERS OF SOCIETY OF SAI

The General Body (Society) of SAI and Governing Body of SAI were re-constituted by Department of Sports, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports in 2010 by orders placed at **Annexure I & II**. The General Body and Governing Body of SAI are to be headed by Union Minister of Youth Affairs & Sports as its President and Chairman respectively.

The Governing Body of SAI met on 24th July, 2009 during 2009-10 under the Chairpersonship of Dr. M.S. Gill, Hon'ble Union Minister for Youth Affairs & Sports **Annexure-III**.

1.3 ORGANIZATIONAL SET-UP

Director General is the Principal Executive Officer of SAI assisted by Secretary, Executive Directors and Heads of the Academic Institutions/ Regional Centres/Sub-Centres. A chart giving details of the organizational set-up during 2009-10 is placed at **Annexure-IV**.

CHAPTER-II

2.0 SPORTS PROMOTIONAL SCHEMES

Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI aim at development and promotion of sports at grass-root level in the country to achieve excellence at the National/ International level by grooming the talented children. The following Sports Promotional Schemes are being implemented by the Operations Division through the Regional Centres/Sub Centres/ Academics Institutions:-

- 1) National Sports Talent Contest (NSTC) Scheme
- 2) Army Boys Sports Companies (ABSC) Scheme
- 3) SAI Training Centre (STC) Scheme
- 4) Special Areas Games (SAG) Schemes
- 5) Centre of Excellence (COE) Schemes

The salient features of the aforesaid Schemes being implemented by SAI are enumerated below:

2.1 National Sports Talent Contest (NSTC) Scheme

Introduction

The NSTC Scheme was launched during 1985 under the scheme talented young children between the age group of 8-14 years are spotted and nurtured by providing scientific training.

Objectives

The main concept of the scheme is to PLAY & STUDY in the same school. The scheme envisages scientific scouting of talent at optimum age essential for converting the genetically and physiologically gifted children into future medal hopes in various competitions at National and International level.

Adoption of Schools

Under the scheme, the schools having good sports infrastructure are adopted. Each adopted school in addition to getting the services of coaches for imparting training to the trainees gets financial assistance for purchase of consumable sports equipment.

Selection Criteria

The selection of trainees under the above scheme is done on potential / performance basis.

- i) Medal winners in State/National Level Competitions are automatically admitted into the Scheme subject to their being found medically fit.
- ii) Medal winners at District Level Competitions or have participation in State Level Competitions are admitted subject to their being found fit medically and physically and also have the required potential which is assessed by battery of tests.
- iii) Selection from remote, tribal & coastal areas is done by organizing competitions.
- iv) The selection for team games as well as individual events is done by a Selection Committee consisting of representatives of SAI, School/Akhara, SAI coaches, Sports Scientists etc.
- v) The sports persons identified on this basis are offered admission after age verification, medical examination and finding suitable by applying battery of tests.

Disciplines Covered

Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Boxing, Football, Gymnastics, Hockey, Judo, Kabaddi, Swimming, Table Tennis, Tennis, Volleyball, Wrestling & Indigenous Games & Martial Arts.

Facilities Provided

Selected trainees are admitted on non-residential basis. In exceptional cases, the trainees are admitted on residential basis and they are provided boarding & lodging facilities.

Status Position

At present, there are **22** Regular Adopted schools, in which **947 trainees (710 Boys & 237 Girls)** are being trained. **(Annexure V)**

(a) Extension of NSTC Scheme to Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalayas (JNVs)

Keeping in view the need to promote sports in remote and rural areas & to provide greater balance for village children, the Governing Body in its 27th meeting held on 9th July, 2001 approved the proposal for extension of NSTC Scheme to Navodaya Vidyalayas having the requisite infrastructure. These Centres are established in association with Navodaya Vidyalaya Samiti. These schools also act as feeder centres to SAI Training Centres and SAG Centres.

In compliance of the directions of Governing Body at its meeting held on 24th July, 2009, **33** Jawahar Novodaya Vidyalayas have been de-adopted.

Status Position

At present, there are **16** Navodaya Vidyalayas, in which **103 trainees (63 Boys & 40 Girls)** are being trained. **(AnnexureVI)**

b) Extension of NSTC Scheme to Schools having tradition of Indigenous Games & Martial Arts (IGMA)

With a view to promote indigenous Games & Martial Arts in the schools in rural and semi-urban areas and scouting of talent in these games for nurturing in modern sports, the Governing Body of SAI in its 28th meeting held on 12th November, 2001 approved the proposal for adoption of schools run by Educational Institutions for promotion of indigenous games & martial arts as part of the existing NSTC scheme.

(c) Extension of NSTC Scheme to Akharas

In order to create a broader base for modern Wrestling and to supplement the efforts made by various akharas, SAI has adopted many Akharas under NSTC Scheme.

At present, there are **37 Akharas** adopted to Promote Indigenous Games & Martial Arts, in which **637 trainees (612 Boys & 25 Girls)** are being trained (**Annexure VIII**).

d) Extension of NSTC scheme to Sports Centres adopted on the pattern of akharas

The Governing Body of SAI in its 31st meeting held on 20th September'2006 approved adoption of Sports Centres on the pattern of Akharas. Under the scheme, high performance

Sports Centres being run, specially in the Priority disciplines, such as Athletics, Judo, Wrestling, Boxing, Swimming and other recognized.

Martial Arts akin to modern sports, are provided with the support as is being provided to the Akharas.

Status Position

At present, there are **05 Sports Centres** adopted on the pattern of akharas, in which **91 trainees (78 Boys & 13 Girls)** are being trained. **(Annexure-VIII)**.

In total, there are **22 Regular Adopted schools**, **27 schools** adopted to Promote Indigenous Games & Martial Arts, **16 Navodaya Vidyalayas**, **37 Akharas** and **05 Sports Centres** on the pattern of akharas, in which total of **2126 trainees (1697 Boys & 429 Girls)** are being trained.

2.2 Army Boys Sports Companies (ABSC) Scheme

The scheme is a joint venture of the Army Authorities and SAI with a view to leveraging the excellent infrastructure, efficient administration and disciplined environment for sports training available in the various Army Regimental Centres. Boys in the age group of 8-16 years of age are inducted under the scheme. After attaining the required age, the trainees are also offered job in the Army.

Selection Criteria

The selection of trainees under the above scheme is done on potential and performance basis as applicable under the NSTC Scheme.

Disciplines Covered

Athletics, Archery, Basketball, Boxing, Diving, Equestrian, Football, Gymnastics, Handball, Hockey, Kayaking & Canoeing, Swimming, Shooting, Rowing, Volleyball, Wrestling & Weightlifting.

Facilities Provided

Under the Scheme, the trainees are provided Boarding & lodging, Educational Expenses, Sports kit, Insurance, Medical cover, Competition exposure & scientific coaching from experienced coaches.

2.3 SAI Training Centres (STC) Scheme

The main objective of the scheme is to train meritorious sportspersons in the age group of 14-21 years. Relaxation in age is given in meritorious cases and also in disciplines of Gymnastics and Swimming. Under the scheme, the Centres are set up in joint collaboration with State Govt./UT Administration. The following facilities are provided by the State Government and Sports Authority of India:

a) Facilities to be provided by State Govt.

- i) A suitable building for hostel with facilities for catering, library, recreation and family accommodation for In-charge of the Hostel and the coaches.
- ii) Playfields/ Indoor Hall/ Swimming Pool depending on the disciplines identified.
- iii) Maintenance of playfields for day to day training.
- iv) Annual maintenance of the hostel building.

b) Facilities to be provided by SAI :

- i) Furniture for hostel and catering equipment.
- ii) Nutritious and balanced diet.
- iii) Sports kit.
- iv) Coaches.
- v) Sports equipment.
- vi) Medical assistance and insurance.
- vii) Administrative and catering staff.
- viii) Electricity, water and administrative staff.

Selection Criteria

- Medal winners in State/National Level Competitions in Individual events and Team games are automatically admitted into the Scheme subject to their being found medically fit.
- Medal winners at District Level Competition or having participation in State Level Competitions are admitted subject to their being found fit medically/physically and also having the required potential which is assessed by battery of tests.

Disciplines Covered

Athletics, Archery, Badminton, Basketball, Boxing, Cycling, Diving, Football, Fencing, Gymnastics, Handball, Hockey, Judo, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Karate, Lawn Tennis, Swimming, Sepak-Takraw, Shooting, Softball, Table Tennis, Taekwando, Volleyball, Water Sports, Weightlifting, Wrestling, & Wushu

- (i) Annual Maintenance Grant **Rs.7.50 lacs** is provided per centre per annum .
- (ii) Scientific training is imparted to inducted trainees by the experienced coaches, besides Boarding & lodging, Sports kit, Competition exposure, insurance & medical cover, educational expenses and TA/DA for Home Town once a year. The management, maintenance and upkeep of the centres are looked after by the SAI.

Status Position

At present, there are **58 Centres** in which **7658 (5453 Boys & 2205 Girls)** are being trained (**Annexure-X**).

2.4 Special Area Games (SAG) Scheme

The main objective of the scheme is to scout natural talent for modern competitive games and sports from tribal, rural, coastal and hilly areas of the country and also from regions having genetic/geographic advantage and nurture them scientifically for achieving excellence in modern competitive games and sports. The trainees are adopted in the age group of 14-21 years.

The Special Area Games Centres are started in consultation with the State Govts./UT Administration. The State Govt. has to provide requisite land with infrastructure. However, in case of non-availability of infrastructure, the State Govt. has to provide developed land on long-term lease basis to SAI enabling it to create the required facilities. Before the start of the Centre, an Agreement has to be signed between SAI and the State Govt./UT Administration.

Selection Criteria

- (a) Medal winners in State/National Level Competitions are automatically admitted into the Scheme subject to their being found medically fit.
- (b) Medal winners at District Level Competition or having participation in State Level Competitions are admitted subject to their being found fit medically/physically and also having the required potential, which is assessed by battery of tests.

Facilities Provided

- (i) Annual Maintenance Grant of **Rs.7.50 lacs** is provided per centre per annum
- (ii) The details of financial assistance provided to residential and non-residential trainees under the scheme is given below :-

2.5 Extension Centres of STC/SAG Centres to cover schools/colleges for wider coverage

The basic concept of the scheme is to develop sports standard in schools and colleges who organize specific sports and have shown commendable results. The trainees in the age group of 14-21 years are adopted under the scheme.

Selection of the Institutions.

Schools and colleges actively involved in sports and having adequate infrastructure are eligible under this scheme. The institution should have a past history of producing national and international sports persons. The Schools and Colleges should also agreeable to the norms laid down by SAI from time to time.

Selection of Trainees & Age Group:

There will not be more than 20 trainees in a School/College between the age group of 14 to 21. The students of nearby schools/colleges can also be admitted. The selection of trainees is done by a duly constituted committee consisting of (1) Regional Director or his representative (2) The Head of the College/Institute or his representative (3) Experts/Coaches from the school/college of the concerned discipline (4) Outstanding sports persons of the area. The recommendation of the Committee send to Head Office for final approval. Age can be relaxed in exceptional cases only with the recommendation of above committee and approval of the Head Office.

Monitoring:

These Extension Centres are monitored by the nearest STC/SAG and the Regional Centre. The power to sanction such centres rests with the Director General.

Facilities Provided:

- (i) Annual Maintenance grant upto Rs.1.00 lacs per centre per annum for 20 players
- (ii) Facilities to the trainees are provided as under:-

At present, there are **100** Extension Centres in which **1439 trainees (839 Boys & 600 Girls)** are being trained. **(Annexure - XII)**

2.5 Centre of Excellence (COE) Scheme

The scheme envisages advance training of elite sports persons in particular disciplines and also to provide competition exposure. The trainees in the age group of 17-25 years are selected under the scheme who have shown promising performance in the senior national competitions.

These Centres of Excellence operate as regular coaching camps for the best available talent in India and provide two or possibly three concurrent layers of highly skilled sports persons giving a wider choice of talent and continuity for later selection to National Teams and provide alternative second and third options for the National Teams.

Selection Criteria

- 1) Best six in Sr. National Competitions provided they have the potential to continue in competitive sports for at least 2 to 3 years.
- 2) Trainees showing excellent performance in the Schemes of SAI as well as talented sports persons scouted collectively by the SAI and National Sports Federations for advance training.

Facilities Provided

Under the Scheme, the trainees are admitted both on residential and non-residential basis where they are provided scientific training by experienced coaches. They are also provided AC 2nd Class to and fro train fare for Home town twice a year, besides the following facilities:

CHAPTER-III

3.0 REGIONAL CENTRES/SUB-CENTRES OF SAI

The different Sports Promotional Schemes and the academic programmes of SAI are being implemented through the Regional Centres/Sub-Centres and Academic Institutions spread across the country.

Objectives and Functions

- To conduct coaching camps and to assist the national teams for participation in International competitions
- To implement and monitor the sports promotional schemes of SAI and Govt. of India, in the Region
- To conduct Diploma course in Coaching in collaboration with the Academic Wing of SAI at NSNIS Patiala
- To raise the technical competence and knowledge of the coaches by conducting refresher course
- To conduct refresher course for Physical Education teachers
- To provide organizational support, documentation and sports science information to all concerned with a view to achieve excellence in sports
- To liaise with other organizations/sports bodies, State Govt./UT Admn., to provide information on sports related subjects
- To identify sports talent among different age groups and grooming them for achieving excellence in their performance
- To provide scientific back-up to sports persons in achieving high level performance in sports

The details of the Centres/Sub-Centres are as follows: -

3.1 Netaji Subhas Eastern Centre, Kolkata

The SAI Eastern Centre was established on 23rd January, 1983 at Salt Lake City, Kolkata on an area of 42 acres and covers the States of Bihar, Jharkhand, Orissa, West Bengal, Tripura and Andaman & Nicobar Islands.

Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports (NSNIS) Patiala and the Lakshmi Bai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Thiruvananthapuram are the two academic institutions under SAI.

4.1 Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports, Patiala

The National Institute of Sports set up by the Govt. of India on 7th May 1961 to herald an era of systematic and scientific sports coaching in country. It became the Academic Division of Sports Authority of India w.e.f. 1st May 1987. It is considered as a premier sports Institute in Asia and is located at Moti Bagh Palace, Patiala(Punjab) with a total area of 268 Acres.

Aims & Objectives of the Institute

- To conduct short & long term academic courses in sports coaching, sports sciences and other related fields.
- To raise the competence of the coaches through organization of Refresher Courses for Coaches.
- To provide assistance to the National Sports Federations for conducting the National Coaching Camps to international competition.
- To provide scientific back-up to the elite sportspersons for achievement of high level performance.
- To organize conferences, seminars and workshops, on sports related subjects.
- To serve as a source of information and counseling on sports infrastructure, through experts.
- To implement Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI.
- To identify sports talent in identified disciplines and to groom them through scientific sports coaching for achievement of excellence in sports.
- To implement the sports promotions schemes of the MYA&S.

(b) M.Sc. in Sports Coaching

The two year degree Course affiliated with Punjabi University, Patiala is conducted by the Institute at Patiala Centre only. No candidate was admitted in M.Sc. Sports Coaching for the session 2008-10. 6 students were admitted in M.Sc. Sports Coaching (2009-11) 04 in Athletics, 02 in Basketball.

(c) Certificate Course in Sports Coaching

The 6 week Certificate Course in Sports Coaching was conducted by the Institute at different SAI Centres, i.e. at Patiala, Thiruvananthapuram, Gandhinagar, Aurangabad, Bangalore, Kolkata and Kandivali(E), Mumbai, overall 348 student attended the Course in 22 sports disciplines.

Faculty of Sports Sciences

The Faculty Supports the teaching faculty and also provides support to the national campers attending coaching camps from time to time. The Faculty of Sports Sciences, established in 1961 consists of following Departments:-

Workshop for National Campers-2010 CWG

1. Sports Authority of India, Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports under the auspices of International Sports Division (ISD) and Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports (MYA&S) organized two days workshop on 10th & 11th February, 2010 for National Campers of 2010 Commonwealth Games. The aim of the workshop was to provide a platform to all those Coaches attached with the National Camps at SAI NS NIS, Patiala to interact with the Scientists for providing and monitoring proper scientific support to the National Campers of Commonwealth Games 2010.

National Coaching Camps

Under the Long-term Development Plan (LTDP), the Institute conducts national coaching camps for training of elite sportspersons at Patiala and the SAI High Altitude Training Centre, Shillaroo (Himachal Pradesh). The detail of national coaching camps held during the year 2009-10 is as under:-

Centre of Excellence

In order to build up proficiency of outstanding sportspersons for excellence at the international level, the Sports Authority of India set up Centres of Excellence at a number of places in the country.

One such Centre is functioning at the SAI Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports, Patiala, where training is being imparted to **68 trainees** in the disciplines of Archery, Athletics, Boxing, Cycling, Fencing Gymnastics, Hockey, Judo, Shooting and Wushu.

SAI Training Centre, Patiala

One STC Training Centre is also in operation at Patiala where 91 Regular trainees, and 109 Day Boarders are being trained in the disciplines of Archery, Athletics, Boxing, Cycling, Fencing Gymnastics, Hockey, Judo, Shooting and Wushu.

Implementation of MYA&S Schemes

The following schemes of MYA&S were implemented by the Institute on agency basis:-

- i) Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan
- ii) National Sports Festival for women
- iii) North East Games
- iv) Promotion of Sports and Games in Schools.

(a) Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan

The Rural Sports Programme which was in existence since 1970-71, has been subsumed in the newly instituted scheme “Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan (PYKKA)” from the year 2008-09, with the following objectives :-

- i) To provide universal access to sports in rural areas and promote a sports culture among both boys and girls.
- ii) To harness available and potential sporting talent among rural youth through a well designed competition structure from the block level.
- iii) To put in place an effective mechanism to identify and nurture sporting talent in rural areas.
- iv) To promote both indigenous and modern game.
- v. To create seamless integration between the competition structure right from the Panchayat level through to the National level in order to facilitate exponential growth in the number of high performing sports persons.

b) National Sports Festival For Women

The origin of National Sports Festival for Women dates back to 1975 when the festival was organized as a part of the celebrations of International Women's year. Considering the impact the festival made an arousing sports consciousness amongst women in the country, the Govt. of India decided to make it an annual feature.

The programme is being implemented by SAI NS NIS Patiala on behalf of Govt. of India in collaboration with States/UTs Administrations.

Under the programme, competitions are organized at Block, Distt. a State level within the States/Uts and participants selected in these competitions are further sent by the States/Uts to the National level competitions.

The National level competitions in 12 sports disciplines divided into three groups organized during the year are as under:-

4.2. Lakshmbai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Thiruvananthapuram

The Lakshmbai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Thiruvananthapuram was set up on 17th August, 1985 by the then Deptt. of Youth Affairs & Sports, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India. Subsequently, the College became an Academic Division of SAI at par with National Institute of Physical & Sports (SNIPES) Board with SAI w.e.f. 1st May, 1987.

The college aims to provide excellent facilities for the upliftment of physical education & sports in the country and to serve as the model institute for teachers' training by offering under-graduate, Post-graduate and research courses. The college is affiliated to the University of Kerala.

- To prepare highly competent and skilled leaders in the field of physical education, sports and games.
- To serve as a Centre of Excellence for research in physical education, Sports sciences and allied areas
- To provide technical, professional and academic leadership to other institutions of physical education
- To develop and promote programmes of mass physical education activity
- To develop model health and fitness programmes for the general population and sports in specific.

CHAPTER-V

5.0 TRAINING OF ELITE ATHLETES AND MANAGEMENT SUPPORT (TEAMS)

TEAMS (Training of Elite Athletes and Management Support) Division is entrusted with the responsibility of preparing the National Teams in different disciplines for various National and International Sports events, in coordination with the National Sports Federations concerned, on behalf of the MYA&S. It provides necessary facilities to elite sportsperson preparing for international sports events like Olympic Games, Asian Games, Commonwealth Games and various other international competitions in India and abroad. It implements the LTDPs prepared in collaboration with various National Sports Federations and approved by the Committee for preparation of National Teams for National and International Tournaments.

5.1 Coaching Camps

Total 223 Coaching Camps in 29 disciplines Table Tennis, Wushu, Basketball, Deaf, Archery, Badminton, Swimming, Boxing, Athletics, Rowing, Gymnastics, Weightlifting, Judo, Hockey, Volleyball, Wrestling, Shooting, SOB, Kabaddi, Fencing, Kayaking & Canoeing, Football, SGFI, Cycling, Taekwondo, Handball, Sepaktakraw, Soft Tennis, Karate were held under the **Scheme for “Financial Assistance to National Sports Federations”**.

Total 146 Coaching Camps in 18 disciplines (Aquatics, Archery, Athletics, Badminton, Boxing, Cycling, Gymnastics, Hockey Lawn Bowls, Netball(W), Rugby 7's (M), Shooting, Squash, Table Tennis, Tennis, Weightlifting, Wrestling, Para-Sports (Swimming, Athletics Table Tennis, Powerlifting) were held under the Scheme for **“Preparation of Indian Team for Commonwealth Games”**.

5.2 Sports Science back-up

It provided scientific back-up in the form of doctors in Sports Medicine, Scientists, Physiotherapists and Masseurs etc. to the sports persons during national coaching camps for enhancing their fitness, recovery from injury and recovery from medical deficiency.

5.3 Coaching Support

It provided coaches, Indian as well as Foreign, for Coaching and training of the players during the national coaching camps and for accompanying the teams abroad.

5.4 Engagement of Foreign Coaches

Total 34 Foreign Coaches were engaged for the training of Indian Sportspersons in 15 disciplines (Basketball, Wrestling, Badminton, Kayaking & Canoeing, Judo, Squash, Shooting, Netball, Lawn Bowl, Rugby 7's, Table Tennis, Athletics, Hockey, Cycling & Swimming).

5.5 Financial assistance to outstanding sportspersons and supporting personnel for extensive training abroad.

Under the Scheme 4 Sportspersons were assisted for advance training.

5.6. Equipment Support

It provided necessary equipment support, both imported as well as indigenous, to the national campers.

5.7 Achievements of the Indian Teams

The achievements of Indian teams in different sports disciplines at the international level during the year 2009-10 are indicated in the **Annexure-XX**

CHAPTER-VI

6.0 EQUIPMENT SUPPORT

Under the Scheme of Central Pool of Technical Sports Equipment, the requisite imported as well as indigenous sports equipment are being procured by SAI and supplied to SAI Regional Centres/Sub Centres/Academic Institutes to bring excellence in training to the regular trainees of Sports Promotional Scheme and for conducting National Coaching Camps in preparation of Indian team to represent the country in international competition. Equipment Support Division also provides non-consumable Sports equipment to the National Sports Federation for holding National/International competition.

Procurement of Sports Equipment

- (i) On the basis of request made by various sports Federation in their LTDP meetings, SAI floated 16 global tenders in February 2008 for procurement of sports equipment for the centres in the discipline of Wrestling, Athletics, Weightlifting, Table Tennis and Judo and delivered the equipment of Wrestling, Athletics and Weightlifting during the year.
- (ii) In order to streamlining the procurement of equipment in Sports for the Commonwealth Games-2010, MYA&S specially designed the scheme to cater for preparation of Indian Team for Commonwealth Games-2010 on 30.9.2010. Para 11.7 of the Scheme states inter-alia "For equipments proposed to be purchased from the indigenous suppliers should be from the suppliers who are on DG, S&D or SAI rate contract. For proprietary and preferred equipment, SAI shall constitute procurement committees of technical and financial experts to scrutinize the tenders/quotations to assess their reasonableness and negotiate the prices. In all cases of procurement or hiring of equipment, SAI shall follow the prescribed procedures and financial delegations as per its Memorandum of Association and financial Bye-laws".
- (iii) There were 18 disciplines for the commonwealth Games-2010 and another 21 disciplines for Asian Games-2010 for which procurement process was initiated by Equipment Supports Division with the approval of Finance Committee and the Governing Body of SAI/MYA&S. Apart from this, procurement was also decentralized to the concerned SAI Regional Heads & National Sports Federations.
- (iv) The Sports Equipment for training of core probable of Commonwealth Games & Asian Games-2010 as quantified by National Sports Federations were procured after assessing the requirement discipline-wise, keeping in view the requirements of the probable who were selected.

The details of imported/indigenous Sports equipment procured during the year for the commonwealth Games, Asian Games and the Sports Science Equipment are indicated in the **Annexure-XXII**

CHAPTER-VII

7.0 NATIONAL COACHING SCHEME

The National Coaching Scheme caters to the objectives of broad-basing sports throughout the country and provides scientific training to the sportspersons in different age groups to achieve excellence in sports.

7.1 The coaches are utilized to impart training to young sportspersons under different sports promotional schemes of SAI. Coaches are also provided to the State Govts./UT Admn. for their State Coaching Centres. In addition to this, the coaches are also involved in the training of National Teams and in the Academic Wing for conducting diploma/Master Degree Courses in different sports disciplines. The coaches are being provided to Universities/Navodaya and Kendriya Vidyalayas also for imparting coaching/training. Monitoring system has been introduced for effective utilization of services of coaches.

During the year Fifteen coaches in different disciplines were sent abroad for attending the International Coaching Course, as per the details indicted at **Annexure-XXI**

CHAPTER-VIII

8.0 STADIA

The Stadia Division is responsible for formulating policy guidelines for utilization of different facilities created in the Stadia at Delhi with the twin objective of broad-basing sports and to achieve excellence in sports.

Objectives:

To provide facilities and venues for

- ❖ National/International competitions
- ❖ National Coaching Camps
- ❖ Regular Coaching for local talent
- ❖ Pay & Play activities
- ❖ Educational Institutions/Federations/other organizations to conduct their sports tournament(s) at different levels.

The following stadia which were constructed/renovated for the IXth Asian Games held in New Delhi in 1982 are being maintained and utilized by SAI on behalf of MYA&S. Name of the Stadiums are as under:

CHAPTER-IX

9.0 COMMONWEALTH GAMES - 2010

The Commonwealth Games which are considered to be the second largest International multi-disciplinary sporting event after the Olympic Games are held every four years. The XIX Commonwealth Games are scheduled to be held in Delhi from 3rd to 14th October, 2010. Approximately, 8000 sportspersons from 71 countries are likely to participate in these Games. India has got the distinction of hosting these coveted Games for the first time. Hosting a sporting event of a scale such as the Commonwealth Games is a matter of International prestige for the country, and is bound to boost brand India. The legacy of the Games will be to boost the sports culture as part of the daily life of every Indian, particularly, the youth.

13.1 Coordination

Coordination Division is a hub Centre of SAI, Primarily dealing with issues relating to Parliament/Parliamentary Committee, Memorandum of Association & Rules of SAI, including conduct of meetings of the General Body/Governing Body. It is also responsible for preparing Annual Report and its submission to MYA&S alongwith Audit Report & Audited Accounts of SAI for laying before the two Houses of Parliament. This apart, it also liaises with Divisions of Head Office/Regional Centres/Sub-Centres/Academic Institutions/MYA&S on issues of general nature.

Director (Coord.), SAI HO, is the Chief Coordinator Officer for RTI applications and Director General, SAI, is the First Appellate Authority. Further, Director/Dy. Director level officers , Division-wise/Region-wise have been appointed as CPIOs under the Act vide Notification dated 15.09.2008

13.2 Sports Medicine Centre at SAI Head Office

The Sports Medicine Centre (SMC) at SAI HO was established in 1984 as a Plan Scheme of SAI with the objective of providing comprehensive sports medicine back-up through doctors, Scientists, Physiotherapists and Masseurs etc. to the following categories of sports personnel: -

- (i) Those attending national coaching camps in Delhi;
- (ii) Those attending regular training at SAI stadia in Delhi;
- (iii) Those participating in competitions held in SAI stadia in Delhi
- (iv) Those residing at the Residential Wing of SAI in Delhi;
- (v) Emergency medical cover for SAI staff and their families

Since SAI stadia being venues for the Commonwealth Games – 2010 were handed over to CPWD for creating requisite sports infrastructure, the Medical Centre was also temporarily shifted to I.G.Stadium alongwith the other offices of SAI.
