CHAPTER- I

1.0 SPORTS IN INDIA: AN INTRODUCTION

The Sports Authority of India (SAI), a successor Organization of the IXth Asian Games held at New Delhi in 1982, was set up as a Society registered under the Societies Registration Act 1860 in pursuance of the Resolution No. 1-1/83/SAI dated 25th January, 1984 of the then Department of Sports, Govt. of India with the objective of promotion of Sports and Games as detailed in the Resolution. It is also entrusted with the responsibility of maintaining and utilizing, on behalf of Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, the following Stadia in Delhi which were constructed/ renovated for the IXth Asian Games held at New Delhi in 1982 and subsequently renovated for the XIXth Commonwealth Games held at New Delhi in 2010:-

1. Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium Complex
2. Indira Gandhi Sports Complex
3. Dr. Shyama Prasad Mukherjee Swimming Pool Complex (Formerly known as Talkatora Swimming Pool)
4. Major Dhyan Chand National Stadium (Formerly known as National Stadium)
5. Dr. Karni Singh Shooting Ranges (Formerly known as Shooting Range Tughlakabad)

Sports today is an integral part of the all round development of the human personality and achieving excellence in sports has great bearing on national prestige and morale. In order to meet the increasing demands of the changing scenario, National as well as International, Government has taken it upon itself to implement programs to promote excellence in sports. At the forefront of the efforts stand the Sports Authority of India (SAI) – the field arm of the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports. Through its sports promotional schemes, SAI supports and nurtures talent in youth, and provides them with requisite infrastructure, equipment, coaching facilities and competition exposure.

1.1 SPORTS AUTHORITY OF INDIA

Subsequently, in order to facilitate development of SAI as a robust sports promotion body, necessary knowledge and skills in the field of sports coaching and physical education were incorporated by amalgamating the erstwhile Society for National Institutes of Physical Education & Sports (SNIPES) consisting of Netaji Subhash National Institute for Sports (NSNIS), Patiala and its Centres along with two other institutes Lakshmi Bai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE) located at Gwalior and Thiruvananthapuram respectively, with SAI w.e.f. 1st May, 1987. The LNCPE, Gwalior was, however, delinked from SAI in September, 1995 on attaining the status of a “Deemed University”. SAI, today, stands out as an apex body for promotion of sports and sports excellence in the country.

1.2 GENERAL BODY & GOVERNING BODY OF SAI

As per the Memorandum of Association and Rules of SAI, the General Body (Society) and the Governing Body of SAI are constituted by the Government of India. The General Body and Governing Body of SAI were re-constituted by Department of Sports, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports in 2010. Following re-constitution, the Hon'ble Minister of Youth Affairs & Sports heads the General Body of SAI as its President and heads the Governing Body of SAI as its Chairman.

The General Body of SAI has 36 members (excluding the President and Vice-President). Of the total, there are 12 Ex-Officio members. The term of the members (except Ex-Officio members) is for a period of three years from the date of his/her nomination. Composition of the re-constituted General Body of SAI is placed at **Annexure- I**.

The Governing Body of SAI has 31 members (excluding its Chairman and Vice Chairman). Of the total, 14 are Ex-Officio members. The term of the members (except Ex-Officio members) is for a period of three years from the date of his/her nomination. Composition of the re-constituted Governing Body of SAI is placed at **Annexure-II**.

Three (03) Governing Body Meetings were held in the year 2013-14 i.e. 40th Governing Body, 41st Governing Body and 42nd Governing Body Meeting on 24/07/2013, 24/09/2013 and 17/12/2013 respectively. The Minutes of the Governing Body Meetings are placed at **Annexure - III A, III B and III C**.

11th General Body Meeting was held on 11/02/2014. The Minutes of General Body Meeting are placed at **Annexure - IV**.

1.3 AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- To promote and broad-base sports in the country
- To identify/ scout sports talent and nurture it
- To implement schemes/ programmes for achieving excellence in sports in different disciplines at international level in order to establish India as a major sporting power
- To manage the Stadia in Delhi, which were constructed /renovated for the IXth Asian Games held in 1982.
- To act as an interface between the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports and respective State governments, as well as other agencies responsible for promotion/development of sports in the country
- To establish, run, manage and administer institutions to produce high caliber coaches, sports scientists and physical education teachers
- To plan, construct, acquire, develop, manage, maintain and utilize sports infrastructure and facilities in the country
- To initiate, undertake, sponsor, stimulate and encourage research projects related to various sports sciences for up gradation of sports, sportspersons and coaches

- To initiate issues and/ or cooperate with other Central or State bodies and other institutions involved in sports promotion and development of sports excellence in the country.

1.4 ORGANIZATIONAL SET-UP

Director General SAI is the Principal Executive Officer of the Organization. He is assisted by a team of senior functional heads of various departments/ divisions which include Secretary SAI, Executive Directors and Heads of the Academic Institutions/ Regional Centres/Sub-Centres. An organizational chart giving details of the same during 2013-14 is placed at **Annexure-V**.

CHAPTER II

2.0 SPORTS PROMOTIONAL SCHEMES OF SAI

Operation Division deals with implementation of different sports promotional schemes of SAI aimed at spotting and nurturing the talented children in different age groups for achieving excellence at the national/international level.

These schemes are being implemented by SAI through its Regional Centres located at Bangalore, Kolkata, Gandhinagar, Bhopal, Sonapat, Lucknow, Chandigarh, Guwahati and Imphal and Academic Wings located at NS NIS, Patiala and the LNCPE, Thiruvananthapuram. The Sports Science set up is well developed at Patiala, Bangalore and Kolkata and these facilities at other Centres are being upgraded suitably.

The salient features of the schemes are as under:

2.1 NATIONAL SPORTS TALENT CONTEST SCHEME (NSTC)

BACKGROUND :

- i) The Governing Body in its 2nd meeting held on 18/10/84 approved the National Sports Talent Contest scheme proposed by the Sports Authority of India and on the recommendations of the Working Group of Planning Commission. Initially under the scheme the schools having tradition in sports and required sports infrastructure, residential facilities were adopted and provided with one time infrastructure grant of Rs.5.00 lacs (Rs.7.5 lacs for schools at hilly areas) each for creation of new facilities or improvement of existing sports facilities. In addition to this the schools were also provided with an annual grant of Rs.56,000/ which include Rs.20,000/ for purchase of consumable sports equipment Rs.27,500/ for maintenance of existing play-fields as well as Rs.2,500/ towards the purchase of books and magazines etc. & Rs.6,000/ annually towards meeting wages of part-time clerk and groundsman.

The schools were adopted on the following considerations:

- a) The schools should have some basic sports facilities in three mother disciplines, viz. Athletics, Gymnastics and Swimming and also have 2-3 play fields for outdoor games like football and hockey.
- b) The schools should have scope for further expansion of these facilities. It should be possible to provide the additional sports infrastructure and facilities with the proposed grant of Rs. 5 lakhs from SAI.
- c) The infrastructure and facilities created with the help of grant of Rs.5 lakhs from SAI will have to be maintained in future by the school authorities from their own funds.

- d) The management of the schools, which are adopted by SAI, should be agreeable to associate SAI with their admission policy and machinery and agree to reserve 10% of seats for promising boys and girls talented in sports.
- ii) However, from 1998-99 after review of the scheme, the system of providing one time infrastructure grant was discontinued and now schools with infrastructure facilities for playing are only adopted and are provided with an annual grant of Rs.20,000/- for purchase of consumable. (However no school was adopted after the review). Under the new concept the residential trainees are provided boarding/lodging in addition to Competition exposure Rs.2000/- & Sports Kit Rs.2000/- per head per annum. The day boarders instead of boarding lodging are provided a stipend of Rs.300/- per head per month.
- iii) As per the directions given by the then Hon'ble Prime Minister of India in the capacity of President, SAI at the General Body meeting held on 31st July, 1993, the schemes were first reviewed by an independent agency (Tata Consultancy Service) engaged by the Deptt. of Youth Affairs & Sports in 1994. The TCS submitted its report in June, 1994.
- iv) After examination of the report by a Committee headed by Secretary (YA&S) and subsequently by MOS, the recommendations were submitted to the Governing Body at its 20th meeting of the Governing Body held on April 6, 1995. The matter was further discussed in a Special Meeting of the Governing Body of SAI held on 25th May, 1995 and the following decisions were taken:
- a) Introducing the day boarding concept under the NSTC scheme.
- (b) Closing of schools, which are not functioning well, if there is no scope of improvement.
- (c) Adoption of new schools preferably from KVS, NV, Sainik Schools and other residential/semi-residential schools, if they have good sports reputation and the management takes keen interest in participation in sports and students of the school have been winning various tournaments.
- v) Based on the above directions day boarding concept was introduced under NSTC Scheme. Under this scheme each day boarders are allowed refreshment allowance of Rs.10 per day and also lump sum amount of Rs.15,000/- to the school.
- vi) As envisaged in the Tata Consultancy Report based on revised scheme the adopted children will be given stipend instead of lodging and boarding expenses. As explained earlier they will also get Rs.3000 per annum for sports kit as well as for competition exposure. Thus the expenditure per child was limited to Rs.6000/ per year. Per head expenditure under the residential scheme works out to Rs.25,000/- per year and in the revised scheme 3 children could be nurtured and trained in the above amount. In other words, the coverage of NSTC scheme could be widened by taking more schools in the ambit of scheme. However, the selection criteria for admission will remain the same as that of residential trainees.

- vii) The Acceptance Committee of the Tata Consultancy Report also recommended for introducing day boarding concept in the schools with a view to train talented children in the schools, thus, enlarging the base and creating multi-player effect in the scheme. Revision as now being carried out is based on the above criteria only. As it may be difficult to weed out all the children presently there in the adopted schools, it has been felt necessary that as and when children are weeded out, the new admission in that school will be under day boarding scheme only. Gradually all the hostlers will be exhausted and adopted school system will be continued on non-residential basis.
- viii) On the basis of the review taken from time to time on NSTC and also based on the review of the scheme conducted by Tata Consultancy Report, 30 schools were de-adopted or kept in abeyance from the list of 62 schools.
- ix) Further as per the directions of the Governing Body and Finance Committee for increase in number of trainees it was felt desirable to adopt more schools and Akharas as also to increase the number of trainees in the existing schools. Therefore the Regional Directors were asked to take up the matter with the concerned State and submit a list of schools, which have infrastructure facilities for adoption. The Director General in consultation with the Regional Directors, short-listed 26 schools and 11 Akharas out of 77 received from the State Governments/Regional Directors. The list of 26 schools & 11 Akharas finally identified was submitted to the Finance Committee at its meeting held on September 1, 1999).
- x) Subsequently a list of 26 schools identified for adoption was submitted to the MOS (Chairman of Finance Committee) on 9.12.99 and after his approval, a notification for adoption of schools was issued on 29.12.99.
- xi) At the time of presentation to the Hon'ble Minister of Sports about the various activities of SAI on 16.5.2000 it was decided that the scheme may be got reviewed and till further instructions, adoption of the new schools and Akharas may be kept pending. It was further desired to maintain the status quo with respect to the trainees. Accordingly, instructions were issued to the Regional Offices for not adopting newly identified 26 schools and 11 Akharas. The detailed proposal was submitted to the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports on 19.5.2000 for getting the scheme reviewed.
- xii) The SAI operational schemes were reviewed by the Working Group of the Planning Commission at the time of approval of 10th Plan documents. On the directions of Working Group necessary modifications were carried out and modified schemes were approved by the Governing Body of SAI in its 27th meeting held on July 9, 2001 for implementation during 10th Plan. Under NSTC scheme the following modifications have been carried out
- Adoption of schools for promotion of indigenous games and martial arts,
 - Extension of schemes to Navodaya Vidyalayas,

- Adoption of akharas and
 - Providing equipment support to upcoming akharas.
- xiii) During 2002-03 27 schools adopted for promotion of indigenous games and martial arts, 24 Navodaya Vidyalayas, 5 akharas and equipment support provided to 15 upcoming akharas.
- xiv) The selection of trainees for the adopted Navodaya Vidyalaya will be conducted covering the jurisdiction of 4 vidyalayas for admission in one school. With this by the end of 10th Plan Period all the Navodaya Vidyalayas will be covered.
- xv) During 2003-04 budget provision has been made for adoption of 25 Vidyalayas, 10 akharas and to provide equipment support of 10 akharas.
- xvi) For effective and competitive training, it is essential to have a minimum of 10-15 trainees in Individual events and to form at least two teams in the Team events, therefore, RDs were requested to take corrective action for induction of more trainees to be scouted as per the laid down criteria.
- xvii) The Regional Centres are requested to recommend those schools with their comments which are not interested to continue the NSTC scheme so that approval of the competent authority can be obtained for de-adoption or be kept in abeyance.
- xviii) The scheme is being monitored at Regional Centres regularly.

The National Sports Talent Contest Scheme was launched during 1985 under which the talented young children between the age group of 8-14 years are spotted and nurtured by providing scientific training.

Objective:

The main concept of the scheme is to PLAY & STUDY in the same school, Scientific scouting of talent at optimum age of 8-14 years essential for converting the genetically and physiologically gifted children into future medal hopes in various competitions at National and International level.

Disciplines covered under the NSTC:

Regular schools - Athletics, Basketball, Football, Gymnastics, Hockey, Kho-Kho, Swimming Table Tennis, Volleyball & Wrestling.

IGMA - Archery, Kabaddi, Kalariapayatu, Khomlainai, Mukna, Silambam, Thangta, Malkhamb, Gatka.

Sports Centre on the pattern of Akharas – Football & Judo.

NS NIS trained coaches are provided to schools, akhara & sports centres.

Selection Criterion:

1. For Regular schools/ Akharas - Trainees, who are medal winners in State/National Level Competitions are automatically admitted into the Scheme, subject, to their being found medically fit. Trainees who are medal winners at District Level Competition or have participation in State Level Competitions are admitted subject to their being found fit medically and physically and also have the required potential which is assessed by battery of tests.
2. For selection from the remote, tribal & coastal areas, the trainees are also selected through competitions organized for the purpose. Selection is done by a Selection Committee consisting of representatives of SAI, School/Akhara, SAI coaches, Sports Scientists etc. The sports persons identified on this basis are offered admission after age verification, medical examination and on found suitable by applying battery of tests.
3. IGMA - Open competitions are organized for scouting and spotting of talent.

FACILITIES PROVIDED UNDER THE NSTC SCHEME

Presently under the Scheme, selected trainees are admitted on non-residential basis. However as an exceptional case the trainees have been admitted in two schools on a residential basis and they are provided boarding & lodging facilities instead of stipend.

- a) The adopted Akharas in addition to the service of experienced coaches is also provided one set of Wrestling Mat and /or Multi-Gym.

At present, under the NSTC Scheme, there are **14** Regular adopted schools (**details placed at Annexure - VI**), **07** schools adopted to promote indigenous games/martial arts (**details placed at Annexure - VII**), **32** Akharas adopted (**details placed at Annexure - VIII**) and **02** Sports Centres adopted on the pattern of Akharas (**details placed at Annexure - IX**), in which a total of **1016 (813 Boys, 203 Girls)** are being trained in various disciplines.

2.2 ARMY BOYS SPORTS COMPANY SCHEME (ABSC)

INTRODUCTION

With the ultimate objective to reach international excellence in sports, the Army has joined hands with the Sports Authority of India to nurture talented boys in sports. The termination of boys companies in the Army in 1976 has had a direct bearing on the decline of sports in the services as the Boys Companies were nurseries from which many outstanding sports persons in the past were spotted and trained. Army had joined hands with the Sports Authority of India to nurture talented boys of 8 to 14 years in 18 Boys Companies started with the assistance of SAI during 1991-92 as approved by the Governing Body in its 15th meeting held on 18th January, 1991. The Boys Sports Companies at the time of rising are provided one time financial assistance of Rs. 3 lakhs for creation/development of sports infrastructure and Re. 1 lakh for purchase of non-consumable sports equipment.. During 1999-2000 at the time of rationalization of the scheme for better education, competition exposure, training, scientific support etc. it was decided to merge the 16 BSCs into 8 BSCs. At that time it was felt that the amalgamation of BSC would be advantageous in the long run, as they would be developed as excellent sports school with added advantage of scientific backup sports throughout the training period. This apart, trainee will also get an opportunity to have better education facility from what they are getting at present. 10 new BSCs were raised in Sept. 2004.

OBJECTIVE

This is a collaborative venture of SAI with the Indian Army, The main objective of the Scheme is to make use of the good infrastructure and disciplined environment of the Army for training boys in the age group of 8-16 years of age, to achieve excellence in sports. After attaining the required age of seventeen and a half years, the trainees are also offered placement in the Army.

SELECTION CRITERIA

The selection of trainees under the above scheme is done on potential and performance basis.

- 1) Trainees who are medal winners in State/National Level Competitions are automatically admitted into the Scheme, subject to age verification and being found medically fit.
- 2) Trainees who are medal winners at District Level Competition or have participated in State Level Competitions are admitted, subject to age verification and being medically and physically fit. The potential of the trainee is assessed by a battery of tests.
- 3) For selection of raw talent from remote, tribal & coastal areas, competitions are organized for both team as well as individual games. Selection done by a Committee consisting of representatives of SAI, Army & SMC coaches. Selection is done on the basis of:
 - a) Application of specific games/Skill tests.
 - b) Verification of age between 8 to 16 years.
 - c) Application of Battery of tests on sports persons qualifying in the specific games/skill tests & age-verification to assess their potential.
 - d) Medical examination of sports persons qualifying the above tests.

Disciplines Covered:

Archery, Athletics, Basketball, Boxing, Diving, Equestrian, Fencing, Football, Gymnastics, Handball, Hockey, Kayaking & Canoeing, Shooting, Swimming, Rowing, Volleyball, Wrestling & Weightlifting.

Under the Scheme the trainees are provided boarding & lodging, Educational Expenses, Sports kit, Insurance, Medical cover, Competition exposure, besides scientific coaching from experienced SAI coaches.

2.3 SAI TRAINING CENTRES (STC)

INTRODUCTION

The Govt. of India vide order dated 28.5.87 constituted a Committee with Shri R. Gopaldaswamy, Secretary, DYA&S to study all scheme of Govt. as well as amalgamated SAI (In 1987 the SNIPES Board under which NSNIS & LNCPE were functioning was amalgamated with SAI) which promote sports and games including physical education. The mandate given to the Committee was to review the programmes and schemes and make recommendations for their continuance with or without modification and where necessary also merger the scheme adopted by different agencies. The Committee felt that with a view to get talent from the Rural Areas, bring sports to all and to provide in-house coaching facilities to the talented youth of the country in their own States, Sports Authority of India should launch a scheme known as Sports Project Development Area Scheme (SPDA).

Based on the recommendations of the Committee, a scheme was formulated and placed before the Governing Body in its 12th meeting held on June 30th 1988 for approval. Under the scheme each SPDA centre is to cover 80 to 100 development blocks and would be jointly implemented by the Central & State Govts./Uts. on 50:50 basis. Under the scheme State's share is provided in kind, including basically, the hostel and the land for development of infrastructure for starting the SPDA... The Central Govt. share is provided 75% in hilly areas & 50% in other areas subject to a maximum of Rs. 75 lakhs and Rs. 50 lakhs respectively, keeping in view the project cost of one SPDA centre as Rs. 1 crore, It was originally planned to set up 78 SPDAs. Under the scheme each SPDA is to cater to a maximum of 4 Olympic disciplines based on the popularity of these disciplines in that area.

With the aim to provide coaching, training and nutritional support to sports persons who have attained the advanced level of sports proficiency the scheme known as Sports Hostel was launched by the erstwhile SNIPES Board and at the time of amalgamation with SAI number of sports hostels were in existence.

Based on the study conducted Tata Consultancy Services, the Governing Body in its meeting held on 25th May, 1995 decided to merge both the Scheme and re-titled "**SAI TRAINING CENTRE SCHEME**".

The Earlier (1987) Sports Project Development Area Scheme (SPDA) Scheme and the Sports Hostel Scheme of the SNIPES Board were merged, following a comprehensive study, by the Governing Body of SAI in its meeting held on 25th May, 1995. The new Scheme was titled decided to merge both the Schemes and titled as '**SAI TRAINING CENTRE, (STC) SCHEME**'. The STC scheme was aimed at grooming junior level sports persons in the age group of 14 to 21. Consequent to the scheme being reviewed in 2012, the age group has been changed to **12 to 18** years. In order to establish and run SAI Centres, the State Government were to provide all the infrastructure facilities, with SAI providing boarding and lodging to the selected trainees, scientific training / equipment support and minor current repairs of the infrastructure.

OBJECTIVE:

Main objectives were to make it possible for the Central Government and State Governments to work together for sports development efforts, through integration of various Schemes. Correct existing regional imbalances in sports infrastructure in the Country and within a State. Enable SAI to nurture junior sports talent scientifically who had attained excellence at Sub Junior level under NSTC Scheme and induct them into the STCs/Centres of Excellence, for further scientific and in-depth coaching on a long term basis.

Archery, Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Boxing, Cycling, Fencing, Football, Gymnastics, Handball, Hockey, Judo, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Karate, Kayaking & Canoeing, Tennis, Sepaktakraw, Shooting, Softball, Table Tennis, Taekwando, Swimming, Volleyball, Weightlifting, Wrestling & Wushu.

2.4 SPECIAL AREA GAMES SCHEME (SAG)

Under this Scheme, Centres are started in consultation with the State Governments/ UT Administration with infrastructure like playing fields, indoor halls equipment support/ coaches etc. entirely funded by SAI/ Ministry.

OBJECTIVE

Special Area Games (SAG) Scheme aims at scouting natural talent for modern competitive sports and games from inaccessible tribal, rural and coastal areas of the country and nurturing them scientifically for achieving excellence in sports. The Scheme also envisages tapping of talent from indigenous games and martial arts and also from regions/ communities, which are either genetically or geographically advantageous for excellence in a particular sports discipline. The main objective of the Scheme is to train meritorious sports persons in the age group of **12-18** years, with age being relaxed in exceptional cases.

DISCIPLINES COVERED:

Archery, Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Boxing, Canoeing, Cycling, Fencing, Football, Gymnastics, Handball, Hockey, Judo, Kabaddi, Karate, Kayaking, Rowing, Shooting, Swimming, Taekwando, Volleyball, Weightlifting, Wrestling & Wushu.

2.5 EXTENSION CENTRES OF STC/SAG CENTRES

OBJECTIVE

The extension centres of STC/SAG centres Scheme was started to cover schools and colleges for wider coverage in 2005, with a view to develop sports standards in schools and colleges which had requisite basic infrastructure and had shown good results in sports. Trainees in the age group of 12-18 years are adopted under the Scheme.

DISCIPLINES COVERED:

Archery, Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Boxing, Cycling, Football, Gymnastics, Handball, Hockey, Judo, Kabaddi, Shooting, Swimming, Table Tennis, Volleyball, Weightlifting, Wrestling & Wushu.

SELECTION OF THE INSTITUTION:

Schools and colleges actively involved in sports and having adequate infrastructure are eligible under this scheme. The institution should have a past history of producing national and international sports persons.

SELECTION OF TRAINEES:

Not more than 20 trainees in a School/College are adopted under the Scheme. The students of nearby schools/colleges can also be admitted. The selection of trainees is done by a duly constituted Committee consisting of (1) Regional Director (SAI) or his representative (2) The Head of the College/Institute or his representative (3) Experts/Coaches from the school/college of the concerned discipline (4) Outstanding sports persons of the area. Age is relaxed in cases of commendable results / exceptional talent.

These Extension Centres are monitored by the nearest STC/SAG and Heads of SAI Regional Centres under whom the respective School/College falls. The power to sanction such Centres vests with the Director General, SAI.

2.6 CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE SCHEME (COE)

OBJECTIVE

As a natural corollary to the Schemes for Sub-Junior and Junior, the Scheme of Centres of Excellence was started in 1997. The scheme envisaged induction of sportspersons, who had performed well at National Competitions, for further advanced scientific training at the Regional Centres of SAI for 330 days in a year. These Centres of Excellence operate as regular coaching

camps for the best available talent in India and provide concurrent layers of skilled sports persons, giving a wider choice of talent and continuity for selection to National Teams and provide alternative second and third options for the National Teams.

SELECTION CRITERIA:

Sports persons who achieve best four positions in all age group in National Championships in individual events and are winners or Runners-up in Team events are selected. The trainees are admitted in the age group of **12 to 25 years**. Those trainees who continue to perform to the desired level at National and International level continue to be covered under the Scheme with age relaxations in deserving cases. Employed trainees are also admitted under the Scheme and are provided the same facilities as those provided to other trainees.

FACILITIES PROVIDED:

COE trainees are provided with the state of art facilities, equipment and scientific back up along with specialized training. The trainees are provided upgraded boarding and lodging facilities, sports kit, sports equipment, competition exposure, insurance, medical expenses etc. as per norms.

Archery, Athletics, Boxing, Cycling, Fencing, Gymnastics, Hockey, Judo, Kabaddi, Kayaking & Canoeing, Rowing, Swimming, Table Tennis, Taekwondo, Volleyball, Weightlifting, Wrestling & Wushu.

2.7 COME & PLAY SCHEME

OBJECTIVE

The 'Come & Play Scheme' was initiated for optimum utilization of SAI sports facilities in Delhi and across the country, and primarily focussed on encouraging local sports persons in areas where SAI sports facilities/Centres are operational. While providing youth from local communities and sports enthusiasts with an opportunity to train under SAI coaches, the scheme provides yet another avenue for those not covered under regular residential/ non-residential schemes. The scheme creates yet another pool of talented sportspersons from where meritorious sportspersons can be scouted and inducted into regular residential sports promotional schemes of STC and SAG.

The Scheme was initiated at various SAI Stadium Complexes in Delhi, in phases, in May, 2011. The enthusiasm and overwhelming response for the scheme encouraged SAI to launch this Scheme at its various Regional Centres/Sub Centres/Academic Institutions/STC and SAG Centres from 1st October 2011.

The scheme is given wide publicity through press release in local media, including newspapers, TV spots and Radio jingles etc. Information/ intimation is provided to various district, block, local authorities and the District Education Officers/District Sports Officers as also Headmasters/Principals of schools/colleges in and around SAI Centres so that maximum number of trainees are made aware of the facilities available, thereby enabling them to access it better.

SELECTION CRITERION

The 'Come & Play Scheme' essentially caters to the 8-17 age group. Following their selection, age specific competitions i.e. 8-10, 10-12 and 12-17 years are conducted twice a year. The first three position holders in the relevant age groups in these competitions are encouraged to participate in the competitions organized for selection of trainees for admission in STC/SAG schemes under Category/Criteria III of selection.

DISCIPLINES COVERED

The specific sports disciplines to be covered are decided by the In-charge Regional Centre/Sub-Centre on the basis of available infrastructure, sports equipment and coaches.

FEE STRUCTURE

A nominal fee of **Rs. 45/- per month** may be charged for specified time allotted usage. Complimentary membership (without fees) is issued to international sportspersons and

national/state medal winners (both in the age group of 17-21 years) during last 3 years, children of SAI employees on yearly basis. Complimentary membership is also given to Below Poverty Line trainees. Girls trainees and children in Government schools are given membership at 1/3rd of the above mentioned fees.

The trainees are provided playing arenas/non-consumable equipments like field, track, tables, mats, etc. Minimum and inescapable consumables like balls, shuttle-cocks, etc. are also provided by SAI. Trainees are, however, required to bring sports equipment like racquets, bats etc.

At present, there are **17273 trainees** (16696 General, 516 National/International and 61 BPL) are being trained in the country.

CHAPTER-III

3.0 REGIONAL CENTRES/SUB-CENTRES OF SAI

SAI Regional Centres/ Sub-Centres and Academic Institutions are the implementing agencies for its Sports Promotional Schemes and academic programmes across the country.

Objectives and Functions

- To conduct coaching camps and to assist the national teams for participation in International competitions
- To implement and monitor the sports promotional schemes of SAI and Govt. of India, in the region
- To conduct Diploma course in Coaching in collaboration with the Academic Wing of SAI at NSNIS Patiala
- To raise the technical competence and knowledge of the coaches by conducting refresher course
- To conduct refresher course for Physical Education teachers.
- To provide organizational support, documentation and sports science information to all concerned with a view to achieve excellence in sports through knowledge enhancement
- To liaise with other organizations/sports bodies, State Govt./UT Admn. and provide information on sports related subjects
- To identify sports talent among different age groups and grooming them for achieving excellence in their performance
- To provide scientific back-up to sports persons in achieving high level performance in sports

3.1 SAI Netaji Subhas Eastern Regional Centre (NSEC), Kolkata

The SAI Eastern Centre was established on 23rd January, 1983 at Salt Lake City, Kolkata. The centre is responsible for implementing and monitoring SAI schemes in the States of Bihar, Jharkhand, Orissa, West Bengal, Tripura and Andaman & Nicobar Islands.

Infrastructure/ Playing facilities.

The Centre is spread over an area of 42 acres, having following facilities:

3.2 SAI Netaji Subhas Southern Centre (NSSC), Bangalore

The Southern Centre was established on 13th April, 1974 at Sree Kanteerava Stadium, Bangalore and later shifted to its present location at Jnanabharathi Campus, Bangalore University, Mysore Road, Bangalore on 29th July, 1985. NSSC Bengaluru is responsible for implementing and monitoring SAI Sports Promotional Schemes in the States of Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Kerala, Puducherry and Tamil Nadu.

II. Academic Programmes:

During the year, the following academic programmes were held at the centre:-

- (i) One year Diploma Course in Sports Coaching commenced from July 2013 with **114** strength in the disciplines of Athletics, Badminton, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Lawn Tennis, Swimming, Softball, Taekwondo and Volleyball.

As per the curriculum, the passed out students were deployed for two months internship to different SAI Training Centres all over the country. The interns were deputed to following SAI centers from 1st May to 30th June 2013.

- (ii) Six weeks Certificate Course in Sports Coaching was conducted from 17th May 2013 to 26th June 2013 with **139** students in the disciplines of Athletics, Basketball, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Softball & Tennis, Swimming and Volleyball.

III. Combined Fitness Programme (July to August)

A combined fitness programme was organized for the entire students Diploma course for six week duration. The primary purpose of this programme was to make the students physically fit at the beginning of the course. Secondly to make them learn the different methods of training and selection of exercises to develop different motor abilities. Faculty members of academics conducted the fitness classes from 2nd week of July to last week of August, 2013.

IV. Faculty of Sports Sciences

Faculty of Sports Sciences was established at this centre, in the year 1990, in collaboration with the erstwhile USSR, with the following objectives in mind:

- To identify sports talent among the children of southern states.
- To monitor the growth and development of talented children in southern region under various schemes.
- To take up applied research/projects to enhance the performance.
- To make the coaches understand and implement the modern methods of scientific training.

Faculty of Sports Sciences has the departments of Sports Physiology, Sports Psychology, General Theory and Methods of Training (GTMT), Biomechanics and Sports Medicine with imported and indigenous equipment for conducting various tests and training.

V. National Coaching Camps

SAI, NSSC, Bangalore has become a major Regional Centre for the conduct of the National Coaching Camps at different level due to its availability of vast infrastructure, scientific

back up, supplemented with moderate climatic condition throughout the year. Most of the National Coaching camps in different sports disciplines in preparation for Olympics, Asian Games, Commonwealth Games, and World Cup and for various International Competitions are held at this Centre / Region.

CHAPTER-IV

4.0 ACADEMIC INSTITUTIONS OF SAI

Two academic institutions, one each in the field of sports coaching and physical education, are functioning under SAI, namely the Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports (NSNIS) Patiala and the Lakshmi Bai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Thiruvananthapuram.

4.1 Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports, Patiala

The National Institute of Sports was inaugurated on 7th May 1961 to herald an era of systematic and scientific sports coaching in country. In the year 1973, the Institute was dedicated to the memory of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose. After the merger of SAI & SNIPES in 1987, the Institute became the Academic Wing of Sports Authority of India. It is considered a Premier Sports Institute in Asia. The Institute is located at Moti Bagh Palace, Patiala (Punjab). The total area of the Institute is 268 Acres.

Aims & Objectives of the Institute

- To conduct short & long term academic courses in sports coaching, sports sciences and other related fields.
- To raise the competence of the coaches through organization of Refresher Courses for Coaches.
- To provide assistance to the National Sports Federations for conducting the National Coaching Camps.
- To provide scientific back-up to the elite sportspersons for achievement of high level performance.
- To organize conferences, seminars and workshops, on sports related subjects.
- To serve as a source of information and counseling on sports infrastructure, through experts.
- To implement the sports promotions schemes of the MYA&S.
- To identify sports talent in identified disciplines and to groom them through scientific sports coaching for achievement of excellence in sports.

I. Academic Programmes

The students for Diploma Course in Sports Coaching 2012-13 session were deputed for two months compulsory Internship at various SAI Centres. **266** students were awarded Diplomas in sixteen sports disciplines at Patiala, **114** students in eight disciplines at SAI NS Southern Centre, Bangalore and **40** students in four disciplines at SAI NS Eastern centre, Kolkata and in all **420** students qualified as Coaches in **22** disciplines. Academic wing of SAI NSNIS, Patiala conducted the following academic training courses under Coaches Education Programme during the year 2013-14:-

(a) Diploma Course in Sports Coaching:

The 10 months diploma course is being conducted by the Institute from July, at four different academic centres of Patiala, Bangalore, Kolkata and Thiruvananthapuram, **275** students in seventeen disciplines at SAI NS NIS Patiala, **106** students in eight disciplines at SAI NS Southern Centre, Bangalore and **61** students in five disciplines at SAI NS Eastern centre, Kolkata, **19** students in two disciplines at SAI LNCPE Thiruvananthapuram and in all **461** students qualified as Coaches, in **23** disciplines.

Academic wing of SAI NS NIS, Patiala is conducting the following academic training courses under Coaches Education Programme during the year 2013-14:

Overall **461** students are undergoing training for the Diploma Course in **23** sports disciplines at these four centers. So far, **17892** persons have qualified under this programme since 1961.

(b) M.Sc. in Sports Coaching:

This two year degree Course is affiliated with Punjabi University, Patiala and is conducted by the Institute at its Patiala Centre only. Six students were admitted in M.Sc. Sports Coaching (2011-13). Three students are admitted in 2013-15. **192** candidates have passed out the course and were awarded the degree.

(c) Certificate Course in Sports Coaching:

The Six Week Certificate Course in Sports Coaching under Mass Education Programme was conducted by the Institute, at various SAI Academic Centres: NIS, Patiala, NS Western Centre, Gandhinagar, SAI NS Western Centre, Aurangabad, LNCPE, Thiruvananthapuram, A.N.University, Andhra Pradesh, Manipal University (Karnataka), KIIT Uni. Bhubneshwar

Orissa. SAI NS Eastern Centre, Kolkata, and SAI STC, Training Centre, Kandivali (E), Mumbai from 17th May to 26th June 2013. In all **820** students completed the Course in 22 sports disciplines. In all **1900** applications had been received for Certificate Course for the session 2013 for various centres. Out of which 1300 students were found eligible for the course. In all, the Institute has trained **25862** persons since 1963. About 2300 applications have been received for the session 2014-15.

II. Faculty of Sports Sciences

The Faculty of Sports Sciences supports the teaching faculty and provides support to the national campers attending coaching camps from time to time. The Faculty of Sports Sciences, established in 1961, consists of following departments:-

IV. SAI Sports Promotional Schemes:-

(a) Centre of Excellence (COE)

In order to build up proficiency of outstanding sportspersons for excellence, at the International level the Sports Authority of India has set up Centres of Excellence at the number of places in the country. These Centres would be operating as regular coaching camps, for the best available talent in India, and would provide two or possibly three concurrent layers of highly

skilled sportspersons giving a wider choice of talent and continuity for selection to the National teams.

One such Centre has been started at the Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports, Patiala during October, 2000, for training of outstanding sportspersons, on scientific lines, to enable them improve their performance at national and international level competitions. Under this scheme, the sportspersons are provided free boarding, lodging, sports kit, sports equipment, competition expenses, insurance and medical expenses.

2013-14 session of Centre of Excellence started from 1st June 2013 and will concluded in the month of ^t May, 2014. There are 81 inmates in Athletics, Boxing, Judo and Weightlifting disciplines. In all, they won **1 Gold medal at the International level and 19 Gold, 7 Silver and 7 Bronze Medals at the National level.**

(b) SAI Training Centre (STC), Patiala

One STC is operational at Patiala with 85 regular trainees and 43 day boarders, who are being imparted training in disciplines of Cycling, Fencing, Hockey and Wushu.

- ii) National Women Sports Competitions (NWSC)

(a) Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan (PYKKA)

The Rural Sports Programme which was in existence since 1970-71, has been subsumed in the newly instituted scheme “Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan (PYKKA)” from the year 2008-09, with the following objectives:

- i) To provide universal access to sports in rural areas and to promote sports culture among both boys and girls.
- ii) To harness available and potential sporting talent among rural youth through a well designed competition structure from the block level.
- iii) To put in place an effective mechanism to identify and nurture sporting talent in rural areas.
- iv) To promote both indigenous and modern games and

- v To create seamless integration between the competition structure from the Panchayat level to the National level in order to facilitate exponential growth in the number of high performing sports persons.

(b) National Women Sports Competitions (NWSC)

The origin of National Women Sports Competition (formerly known as National Sports Festival for Women) dates back to 1975 when the festival was organized as a part of the celebrations of International Women’s Year. Considering the impact the festival made in arousing sports consciousness amongst women in the country, the Govt. of India decided to make it an annual feature and since then the National Sports festival for Women being organized the name of the scheme has now been changed as National Women Sports Competitions from the year 2011-12.

The programme is being implemented by SAI NS NIS Patiala on behalf of Govt. of India in collaboration with States/UTs Administrations. Under the programme, competitions are organized at Block, District and State level within the States and UTs. Participants

selected in these competitions are further sent by the States/UTs to the National Level competitions. The National level competitions were organized during the year in 11 sports disciplines under four groups:-

4.2 Lakshmibai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Thiruvananthapuram.

The Lakshmibai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Thiruvananthapuram was established on 17th August, 1985 by the then Dept. of Youth Affairs & Sports, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India. Subsequently, the College became an Academic Division of SAI at par with National Institute of Physical & Sports (SNIPES) Board w.e.f. 1st

May, 1987. The college aims to provide excellent facilities for upliftment of physical education & sports in the country, and to serve as a model institute for teachers training by offering undergraduate, post-graduate and research courses. The college is affiliated to the University of Kerala. It is established in 50 acres of land taken over from University of Kerala, Karyavattom campus existing on the northern side of NH-47, 1 Km away from Karyavattom Jn.Thiruvananthapuram.

Aims & Objectives

- To prepare highly competent and skilled leaders, teachers, coaches, scholars and administrators in the field of physical education, sports and games as well as associated areas.
- To serve as a Centre of Excellence for research in physical education and allied areas.
- To provide technical, professional and academic leadership to other institutions of physical education elsewhere in India and abroad.
- To provide vocational guidance and placement services to the people in the field.
- To develop and promote programmes of mass physical education activity.

CHAPTER-V

5.0 Training of Elite Athletes and Management Support (Teams)

TEAMS (Training of Elite Athletes & Management Support) Division is entrusted with the responsible of preparing the National teams in the difference disciplines for various National & International Sports events in coordination with the National Sports Federations concerned, on behalf of the Ministry of YA & Sports. In other words, it provides necessary facilities to elite sport person preparing for International Sports events like Olympics, Asian Games, Commonwealth games and World Cup and other International Competitions in India and Abroad. It implements the plans prepared by various National Sports Federations vide their Annual Calendar for Training and Competition (ACTC) and approved by the Committee for preparation of National Teams for National and International Tournaments by providing the following facilities:

5.1 Coaching Camps

During the year, a total of **203** coaching camps were held in **28** disciplines under the Scheme for “**Financial Assistance to National Sports Federations**”. The Camps were held in disciplines of Archery; Athletics; Badminton; Boxing; Basketball; Billiards & Snooker; Cycling ; Football; Golf; Gymnastics; Handball; Hockey; Judo; Kabaddi; Kayaking & Canoeing; PCI Deaf; Rowing; SOB; Shooting; Sepaktakraw; Table Tennis; Taekwondo; Tennis; Volleyball; Weightlifting; Wrestling; Wushu and Yachting . Details of Coaching Camps held during the year 2013 - 14 are provided at **Annexure - XXVII**.

5.2 Scheme relating to Talent Search & Training

No assistance provided to any sportsperson under for advance training under the Scheme Related to Talent Search & Training in the year 2013-14.

5.3 Sports Science Back-Up

It provided scientific back-up in the form of doctors in Sports Medicine, Scientists, Physiotherapists and Masseurs etc. to the Sportspersons during National Coaching Camps for enhancing their fitness, recovery from injury and recovery from medical deficiency.

5.4 Engagement of Foreign Coaches

During the year, a total of 23 Foreign Coaches and 06 Supporting Staff were engaged for the training of Indian Sportspersons in 11 disciplines of Archery, Athletics, Basketball, Badminton, Boxing, Hockey, Squash, Shooting, Table Tennis, Wrestling and Yachting. Details of Foreign Coaches and Support staff are provided at **Annexure - XXIV A** and **Annexure - XXIV B** respectively.

5.5 Equipment Support

It provided necessary equipment support, both imported as well as indigenous, to the National campers.

5.6 Achievements of the Indian Teams

The achievements of Indian Teams / Sports Persons in different sports disciplines at various International level during the year 2013-14. Details are provided at **Annexure - XXV**.

CHAPTER-VI

6.0 EQUIPMENT SUPPORT (ES)\

The important activities undertaken by the ES Division during the year 2013-14 are as under:-

6.1 Implementation of Central Pool of Technical Sports Equipment Scheme:-

The Central Pool of Technical Sports Equipment Scheme, a Plan Scheme of SAI, is being dealt with by the Equipment Support Division. Under the scheme, the requisite Sports Goods, Sports Equipment, Sports Science Equipment (both indigenous & imported) are provided to the Heads of the Centres/Sub Centres/Academic Institutions for use by the National Campers/Trainees under different Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI. The proposals for procurement under the scheme beyond the delegated powers of Regional Heads in pursuance to Office Order No. 45/2012, dated 21.02.2012 are processed at the Head Office, by the ES Division.

Further, the proposals relating to procurement of Sports Goods/Equipment for the National Campers in connection with mega International Sports events i.e. Asian Games, Commonwealth Games, Olympic Games, World Championship, World Cup etc. being received from the TEAMS Division are also processed by the ES Division.

Under the above Scheme, a sum of Rs. 5 Crores was allocated for the financial year 2013-14. The amount has been spent as under:-

- (a) 15 sets of imported Fitness Equipment (comprising 30 items/set) were ordered at a total cost of Rs. 4.05 Crores. Supplies & installation of all the 15 sets has been completed at 15 SAI Centres spread across the country.
- (b) Also, supplies of Rowing Boats – Qty. 25 Nos. and Kayak & Canoeing Boats Qty. 56 Nos. were received from China based suppliers for SAI Centres located at Jagatpur, Alleppey and Bhopal. Further, additional quantity of Rowing Boats (Qty. 06 Nos.) and Kayaking & Canoeing Boats (Qty. 18 Nos.) both valued at US\$ 91419.5 (Rs.54.85 lakhs) was also ordered on the same supplier. Supplies against additional quantity has also been completed. These imported boats conforming to International standards will certainly improve the quality of training to our sportspersons of these disciplines.
- (c) Further, certain equipment in connection with Community Connect Scheme under Rajiv Gandhi Khel Abhiyan (RGKA) was procured and provided to various SAI Stadia in Delhi.

6.2 Providing consultancy / help to outside Organizations:-

ES Division of SAI extended its helping hand to Lusofonia Games-2014 at Goa by way of issue of various equipment available with various SAI Centres. Also, at the request of National Games, Organizing Committee, Govt. of Kerala, a team of SAI Officers was deputed to provide consultancy in setting-up Shooting Ranges and procurement procedures with repeated visits to their office at Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala. The help extended was appreciated to be useful for the NGOC Govt. of Kerala.

6.3 Processing of New Proposals:-

In pursuance of Govt. decision, proposals for conclusion of Rate Contract for various sports goods / equipment (consumable/non-consumable) and various types of sports kit items have been initiated. The proposal is under process & being expedited so that RCs are concluded at an early date. New proposals for purchase of sports goods / equipment will be taken-up based on allocation of funds to the ES Division in the budget for financial year 2014-15.

6.4 Issue of Custom Duty Exemption Certificate to recognized National Sports Federations (NSFs):-

As per the Govt. Policy of providing assistance to the recognized National Sports Federations, 54 Custom Duty Exemption Certificates were issued to various recognized NSFs against their import of sports goods / equipment / training & promotional material during the financial year 2013-14, thus, providing financial assistance for promotion of sports in the Country.

CHAPTER-VII

7.0 NATIONAL COACHING SCHEME

The organised sports coaching commenced in September, 1953 at the initiative of late Rajkumari Amrit Kaur, the then Union Minister of Health with the main objective of serving as an Institute for Sport Coaches and utilising the coaches thus trained at various levels to train the youth of the country both on short and long term basis.

The National Coaching Scheme which is modified version of Rajkumari Amrit Kaur Scheme caters to the objective of broad-basing sports throughout the country and provides scientific training to achieve excellence in sports. Under the Scheme, the coaches are provided to the State Government/UT administration for State Coaching Centre. The coaches are also utilized to impart training to young sports persons under different operational schemes of SAI. In addition to this, the coaches are also involved in the training of national teams and assisting the Academic Wing in conducting Diploma/Masters Courses in coaching in different sports disciplines.

The coaches assist National Federations / Associations / Sports Boards / Universities in the Coaching of National / Inter University / and other teams for important sports competitions. The coaches also assist State Sports Councils in conducting Coaching camps and to prepare State teams for participating in National Championships. SAI coaches also assist the National Sports Federations in conducting National coaching camps in preparation for International competitions.

The SAI Coaches are involved in the talent scouting process through which talented sports persons have been spotted and inducted into various SAI sports promotional schemes i.e. National Sports Talent Contest (NSTC), Special Area Games (SAG), Army Boys Sports Company (ABSC) and SAI Training Centres (STC). Coaches have also been deployed at various Regional Centres of SAI to monitor the progress of training and performance of coaches working in the field. Coaches are also being posted for Come & Play Scheme and Community Connect Schemes of SAI at SAI Head Office and Regional Headquarters.

Though, there is a provision under National Coaching Scheme to provide the coaches to the State Govt. for their State Coaching Centre (SCC), however due to shortage of coaches no SAI coaches was posted outside SAI schemes during the year under report to strengthen its own Sports Promotional Schemes.

7.1 Recruitment of Coaches

After successful completion of recruitment process, 168 Asstt. Coaches are deployed in the month of February'2014 in the 16 disciplines (i.e. Athletics, Archery Badminton, Boxing, Cycling, Fencing, Hockey, Gymnastic, Judo, kayaking & Canoeing, Swimming, Taekwondo, Volleyball. Weightlifting, Wrestling and Wushu).

7.2 Strength of Coaches

As on 31.03.2014 there were 1170 regular coaches & 24 contractual coaches in different sports discipline on the roll of SAI as per details up at **Annexure - XXVI**.

CHAPTER-VIII

8.0 STADIA

8.1 Usage of Five (05) SAI Delhi Stadia Complex

In Delhi, five (05) Stadia were built for the conduct of IXth Asian Games, 1982 and these stadia were handed over to SAI for operation and management :

1. Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium Complex
2. Indira Gandhi Stadium Complex
3. Dr. Shyama Prasad Mukherjee Swimming Pool Complex (Formerly known as Talkatora Swimming Pool)
4. Major Dhyan Chand National Stadium (Formerly known as National Stadium)
5. Dr. Karni Singh Shooting Ranges (Formerly known as Shooting Range Tughlakabad)

8.2 These stadia were renovated / upgraded for hosting the Commonwealth Games – 2010 where state-of-the-art facilities of various games are available at par with International standards.

8.3 All these five stadiums were handed over back to SAI after hosting of Commonwealth Games-2010. These stadiums are being used for the following purposes :-

- a) Hosting of International sporting competitions;
- b) Hosting of national sporting competitions;
- c) Hosting of other sporting events;
- d) Organization of national coaching camps;
- e) Training of sports persons under 'Come & Play' Scheme
- f) Regular Coaching for local sports talent
- g) Sports tournament (s) conducted at different levels by Educational Institutions/Sports Federations/ Corporate bodies and other organizations.

CHAPTER-XI

MISCELLANEOUS

11.0 Personnel

1. The Personnel Division is an essential part of an organization as it deals with the recruitment/ selection of personnel, continuous process of development of its officials through various trainings, etc. and proper utilization of its human resource to achieve the objective of the Organization. The function of Personnel Division is not just confined to recruitment & administration, but also to motivate its employees.
2. The Chief Executive Officer of the Organization (SAI) is appointed by the Government of India as Director General. The Secretary, the second in command is also appointed by the Govt. of India and functions under the guidance of DG with administrative/ financial power conferred on him under the rules of SAI. SAI has its academic institutions at NSNIS, Patiala and LNCPE, Trivandrum. It has Regional Centres at Bangalore, Bhopal, Gandhinagar, Kolkata, Chandigarh, Sonapat & Imphal and two Sub- Centres at Lucknow and Guwahati. At the Head Office, it has TEAMS, Operations, Infrastructure, Equipment Sports Personnel & Coaching, GAD, Stadia, Coordination and Finance & Accounts Divisions which are headed by Executive Directors/ Directors.
3. Vide Office Order No.111/2013 Sh. Hira Ballabh, (IRAS) joined Sports Authority of India, as Executive Director (Finance) on deputation in the PB-4, Rs.37,400-67,00/-+GP Rs.8900/-on 16.4.2013 (AN) initially for a period of three years extendable up to maximum of five years.
4. Vide Office Order No.114/2013 Sh. Hira Ballabh, IRAS, Executive Director (Finance), SAI was assigned the charge of Secretary, SAI, till the appointment of new incumbent.

To provide the best possible medical support to our National Athletes specialists from Departments of Orthopaedics, Ophthalmology, Surgery and Medicine from All India Institute of Medical Sciences, Gangaram Hospital, Delhi and Physiotherapy interns from Jamia Hamdard are roped in to provide consultation to our athletes.

After Common Wealth Games 2010 SAI stadia were made available for the conduct of national coaching camps at Delhi due to better facilities available at Delhi. Federations are keen to utilize the international standards sports infrastructure at SAI stadia and accordingly the number of coaching camps in Delhi have shown sharp increase. 11.10 Library

Sports Library of Sports Authority of India situated at JNS came in to existence in April'1984 with a total of 700 old titles which were mostly gifted by Special Organization Committee IXth Asian Games 1982 consist of few fiction, Pamphlet Annual Report of NIS Patiala and brochure of Asian Countries. The Library has three section viz. Book Section, Journal & Magazine (New arrival) display section and General Newspaper Reading Section, Sports Library at JNS caters to the needs of SAI official / coaches and staff of Sports Authority of India. The Library has books on all Major Sports disciplines viz. Athletics, Cricket, Basketball, Gymnastic, Lawn Tennis, Table Tennis, Asian Games, Olympic games Records, Psychology of the games etc. beside books as Horticulture, painting child craft and computer etc.

There is a total of 12646 numbers of books till March'2014. The total expenditure on books purchase is Rs.2,64,082/- during the year 2013-14.
